The Eastern Star Thimble Club met in the open stand park surroundings on Tuesday afternoon.

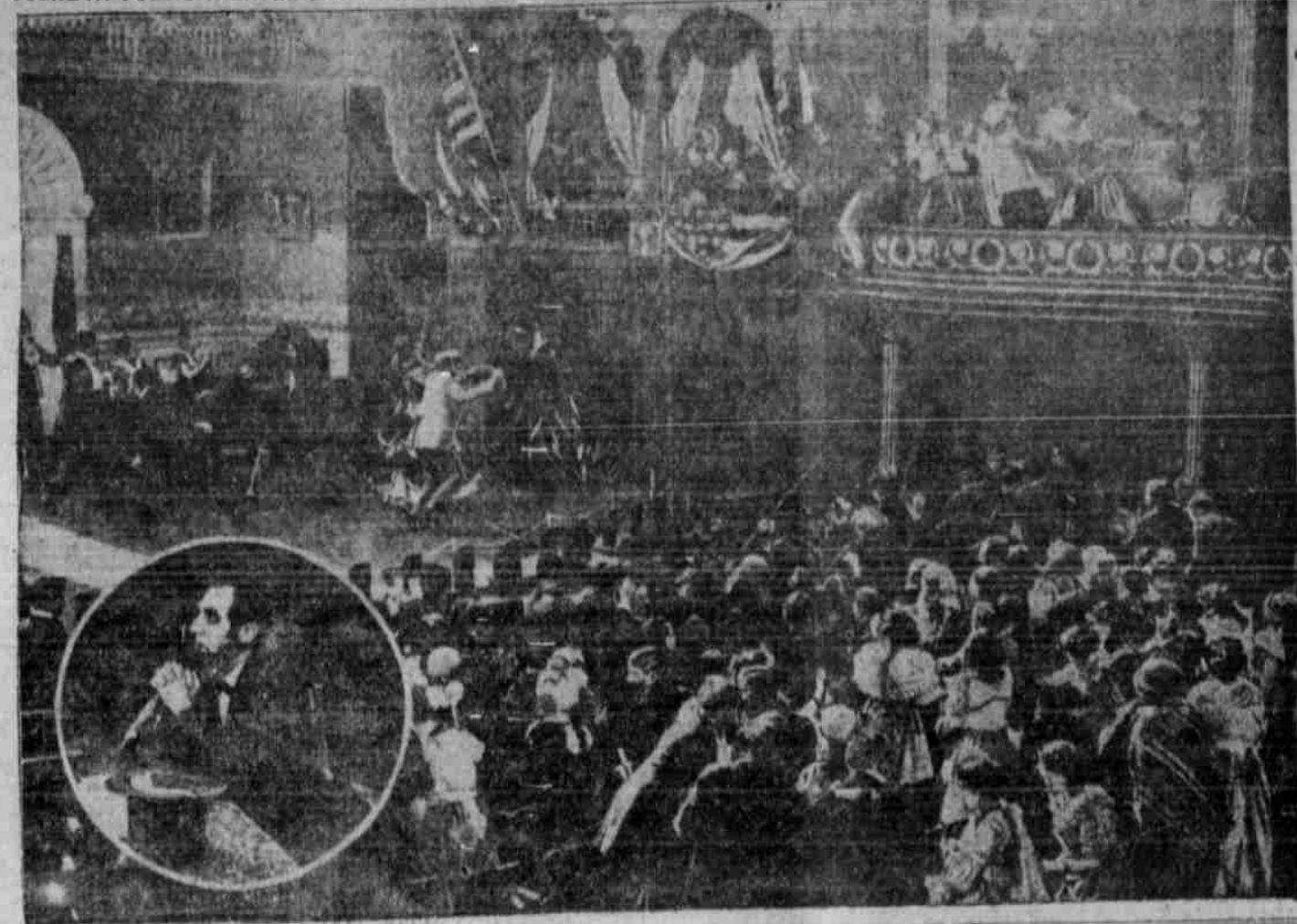
Professor Irvin Vining, accompanied by a trio of ladies, left on Tuesday for a camping outing in the Beaver creek section.
