GREATEST MYSTERY TALES ARE ECLIPSED

OLNEY, Ill., August 1.—In Edgar Allen Poe's phantastical brain there never lived a more sensational crime than that charged against Roy Hinterliter of "Hell Texas"—the murder of his 17-year-old-sweetheart, Elizabeth Ratcliffe.

Air blown into a catheter by someone's breath and pumped into the girl's blood, caused her death—a never-before-heard-of method of murder, absolutely without parallel in all criminal and medical history.

Examination of the girl's body showed an artery had been opened with a hypodermic needle, a catheter inserted in the incision and air pumped into the veins. The rushing air caused an air bubble to reach the girl's heart. Death resulted instantly.

The theory of the state authorities in holding Hinterliter is that he did not know what killed the girl and was as puzzled at the cause of death as the doctors. It is not intimated by the prosecution that the youth had any intention of killing the girl.

The murder of the girl, a farmer's daughter, is the biggest sensation Richard Co. has had since the Mollie Price murder 12 years ago.

When Elizabeth Ratcliffe came from West Salem ten months ago to live with her sister, Mrs. Bert Franckor, she was a happy, pretty, care-free girl. She had known young Hinterliter before, but is said to have favored the attentions of Sam Harlin, an Olney boy. Hinterliter called on her only occasionally until Harlin was called to the colors when the Fourth Illinois marched to the border.

With the field clear, Hinterliter's attentions to the country became more marked. They went buggy riding often. Their last ride, the police say, was on the night the girl died under an old elm tree, two miles south of Olney.

CONVICTS ESCAPE FROM FLAX FIELDS

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 2.—Officials and guards of the state penitentiary were scouring the country near here today for six convicts who escaped late last night from a camp of more than 1000 prisoners engaged in harvesting the state flax crop. Those who escaped were Eddie Bell, J. C. Griffin and Thomas Lindsey, all convicted of larceny; Elmer Barnhard, convicted on a statutory charge; C. D. Jones and John Smith, serving terms for burglary. The men were trustees and were sleeping in a tent outside the stockade.

After an executive conference with Warden Minto, the state board of control today announced that it had decided to abolish the camps for convicts during the flax pulling season. Hereafter the prisoners will be sent each morning to the field from the prison.

ASQUITH TELLS ALLIES AIMS

lines upon which these preparations would proceed.

Premier Asquith repeated that it was an essential condition to peace that Belgium and Serbia be restored, not only politically, nationally and diplomatically, but materially and economically, to the positions in which they stood before the war. The devastated districts of France and Poland will be similarly treated.

Not Aimed at Neutrals.

Reviewing the situation in general, Premier Asquith emphasized two points, first, the determination of the allies to obtain reparation for the devastated areas and second "that these relations are not aimed at neutrals."

"The attention of the government," continued the premier, "has been called to the fact that some apprehension has arisen in neutral countries, more especially in the United States with regard to these resolutions—that the resolutions might be directed against neutrals. This is not the case. The resolutions contemplated only necessary measures of self defense against economic aggression threatening the allies' most vital interests and in carrying them into effect every endeavor will be made to insure neutrals against suffering."

After a series of unsuccessful attacks, some with asphyxiating gas, the Germans gained a little ground in Vaux-le-Chapitre wood and at Chenois.

During the actions the French took

prisoner 100 Germans, including three officers. A Russian reconnoitering party, the statement adds, made a bayonet charge in the Champagne region, dispersing a German detachment.

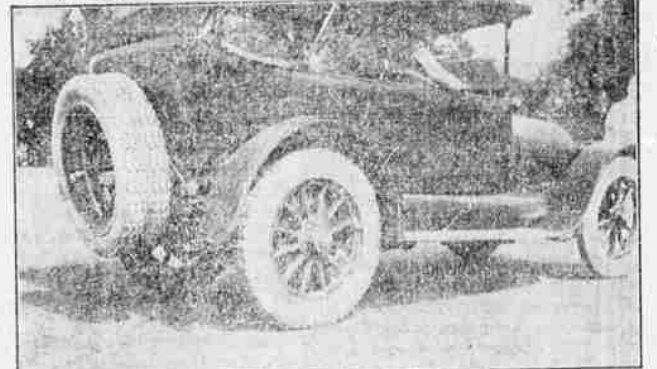
