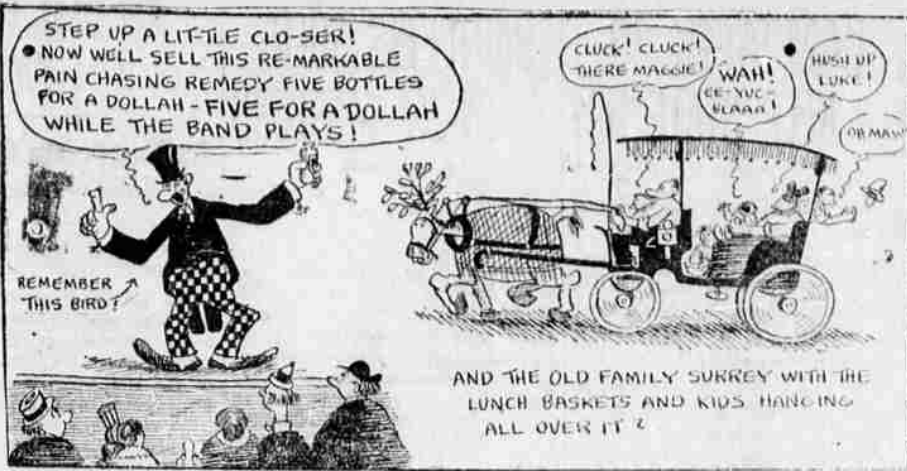


Squirrel Food

SERBIAN ARMY ATTACKS BULGARIANS IN NEW OFFENSIVE

PARIS, Aug. 2.—The Serbian press bureau at Corin has issued the following communication:

"At Meglenisa on July 15 our troops engaged in combat with the Bulgarians around the advance positions, which the latter held in Greek territory.

On July 24, 25 and 26 we carried the heights north of Sevriana and Rovil (Jouvil?) and also the slopes of Strouplinske. Only July 26 and 27 the Bulgarians attacked our troops with small effectives on the positions north and northeast of Strouplinske. They were repulsed

with losses, retreating before our positions with quite a large number of dead.

"Calam prevails on the rest of the front occupied by our troops, whose morale is perfect."
