COPPER ELIMINATED FROM REVENUE BILL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Radical changes have been proposed by sub-committees in the revenue bill which will be considered tonight by the full membership of the senate finance committee. Chairman Simmons said today the notice of the amendments could not be made public until the committee had passed on them, but it is understood that in the omnibus tax section copper has been eliminated and certain other commodities not mentioned in the house bill were added to the taxable list. CHILD LABOR BILL FOUGHT IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Senator Chadwick of Georgia led off the attack on the constitutionality of the anti-child labor law, contending that the right to enact such legislation is vested only in the states. The Georgia senator also pointed out that the senate bill, in his judgment, far exceeds the limits set down by the congress and the supreme court in the lottery statute, which proponents of the measure set up in defense of its constitutionality and after which it was patterned. "I do not wish to be misunderstood in this matter," he said. "I am an thoroughly, as earnestly, sincere in favor of enactment of just, reasonable, humane and God-like laws for protection of children as any man in this chamber, but I say that the sole power to enact such a law is vested in the several states of the union and not in congress. I venture the assertion that the state of Georgia, today has a child labor law, better, fairer and more suited to our conditions than the statute proposed to be set up in this bill."
