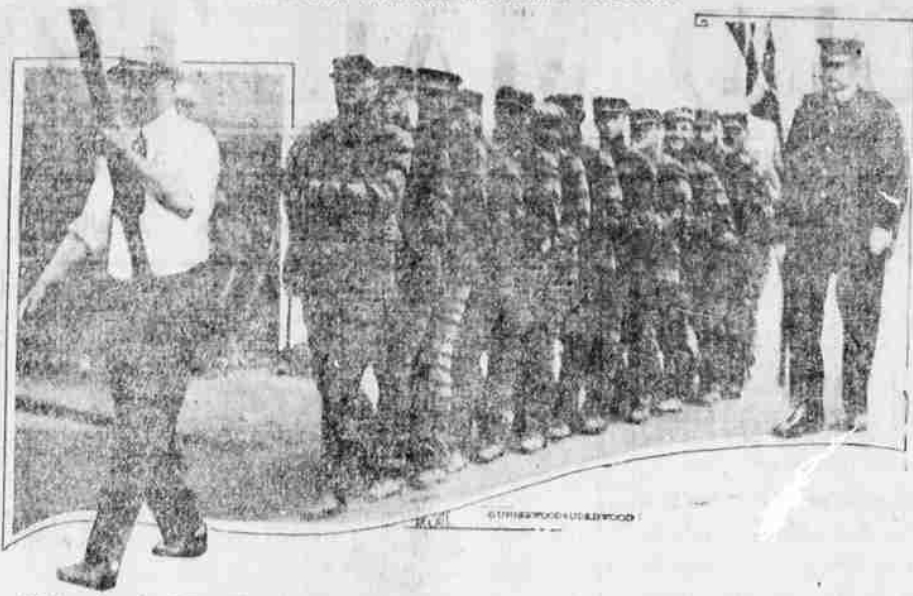


LOCAL AND PERSONAL

MEXICANS KILLED ATTEMPTED CRIME

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 5.—Joe Martino, a Mexican, was shot and killed by Salt Lake police and two other Mexicans were seriously wounded in a spectacular fight late last night, following an attempt by three Mexicans to force their way into a residence with drawn pistols. When the police arrived the Mexicans opened fire, wounding a police detective slightly. The police returned the fire, killing Martino and another. The third Mexican ran to a vacant lot where he continued to shoot, until disabled by the fire of the police. Both wounded Mexicans are expected to die.
