OVER FIVE MILLION PRISONERS HELD IN DETENTION CAMPS

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—More than 5,000,000 prisoners, double the number of men engaged in any previous war that the world has known are now confined in prison camps of the belligerent nations, according to Dr. John Mott, secretary of the international committee of the Young Men's Christian Association, who arrived here today on the Danish steamship Oskar II from Copenhagen. Dr. Mott left here in May for Russia and has visited the prison camps of nearly all the countries at war. Dr. Mott said of the prisoners, Germany has the greatest number, approximately 1,750,000. Russia with 1,000,000 followed in order by France, Italy, Great Britain and Turkey. Russia's prisoners, he added are rapidly increasing more than 400,000 having been added to the camps since the beginning of the last Russian drive. In six weeks, Dr. Mott added, 220,000 passed through Kiev.

TURKS RECAPTURE BITLIS AND MUSH

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 9.—Turkish troops yesterday captured from the Russians the Armenian towns of Bitlis and Mush, it was officially announced today by the Turkish war office.

MILLION DAMAGE BY VIRGINIA CLOUDBURST

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 9.—Property loss exceeding a million dollars was caused by a cloudburst that swept down Cabin creek valley this morning, according to report received here and rumors were persistent that more than a score of persons had been drowned at Acme, W. Va. These rumors were denied by officials of the Acme Coal company.

SENATE DEBATES SHIPPING BILL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—The administration shipping bill was taken up for general debate in the senate today. It was made the unfinished business yesterday, following the passage of the child labor bill. Republican senators are expected vigorously to oppose the shipping bill but its ultimate passage virtually is assured.

SURRENDERING TURKS KILLED GERMAN OFFICERS

LONDON, Aug. 9.—The Turkish army which has been routed by the British in Roman, east of the Suez canal, suffered terrible hardships in their march across the desert, according to a Reuters' Cairo dispatch quoting stories of Turkish prisoners. The dispatch says that batches of prisoners continue to arrive in Cairo. The prisoners say the Turkish losses were exceedingly heavy as they attacked in mass formation in ignorance of the strong defenses of the British. The devastating machine gun fire with which the attack was met was the first indication the Turkish troops had of the task confronting them. According to one of the troops, a Turkish detachment which surrendered first killed their German officers.

ITALIAN GENERAL DIES IN CHARGE

PARIS, Aug. 8.—The dramatic death of the commander of the Italian troops that stormed the Austrian second line trenches on Monte San Michele is described in a dispatch to the Petit Parisien from its correspondent on the Italian front. The dispatch says: "The enemy offered their most intense resistance at the second line trenches on Monte San Michele. Our men dashed forward at a run, to find one trench still protected by wire entanglements. The commander of the attacking battalion said: "Boys, we've got to pass."
