JOE KNOWLES, NATURE MAN, AT THE PAGE

"The Nature Man," is the most exciting, instructive and most fascinating film novelty of the season, and opened yesterday at the Page for a two day run. "The Nature Man" shows how Joe Knowles, big game hunter, trapper and soldier, went into the wilds of the Sierra Nevada mountains in California, and again in the trackless Maine woods, without shelter, just as a new-born babe, and fought for an existence, incidentally winning a bet of several thousand dollars. Knowles leaves civilization stripped of everything except his brains. He makes a fire from two sticks which he rubs together until friction creates a flame; he clothes himself with the skins of animals he kills before the camera lens; he builds his own shelter but, canoe, traps and bows and arrows, and comes out of the forest at the end of six months with enough skins to provide him with a year's living expenses in civilization.

"The Nature Man" is a film extraordinary. Its five reels are jammed with real, primitive Martin Eden adventure. Battles hand-to-hand with a bear in a tree—5 tremendous thrilling spectacles—strangling the bear to death. He traps a savage mountain lion and actually kills it before the camera; at one time he has on his hands a snarling, snapping fight with wildcats and panthers; he kills poisonous rattlers and deadly copperheads in primitive fashion, and meets other wild beasts of the virgin forest in hair-raising fights. Knowles loves to match his bravery and brains against the beasts of the wild, and though his body is covered with scratches and rips from impenetrable claws and fangs, Knowles delights in the scene. "When I get home I take a savage, inexpressible delight in fastening my iron fingers around the throat of the animal that has injured me and slowly strangle it to death."

TEDDY TO SPEAK FOR HUGHES IN MAINE

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—Colonel Roosevelt will make his first campaign speech in behalf of the candidacy of Justice Hughes in Lewiston, Me., on August 21. This was announced today after a conference between John McGrath, Colonel Roosevelt's secretary and Frank J. Ham, republican state chairman of Maine. Colonel Roosevelt's speech will deal only with national issues, it was announced, with the promise that it will be one of the strongest arguments in the fight being waged between republicans and democrats for victory in Maine. Other men of note will participate in the Maine campaign, are Governor Frank B. Willis of Ohio, Senators William E. Borah, Henry Cabot Lodge and Lawrence Y. Sherman and Congressman Nicholas Longworth.
