At the regular council meeting next Tuesday, a charter amendment, already drawn by City Attorney McCabe will be presented for passage, giving the council power to act in settling up the paving situation in Medford. The amendment, as drawn, gives the council power to refund up to 50 per cent of the money paid for paving, that is to refund or reassess, as the case may be in each instance, so that the city pays half the paving cost and the property owner pays the other half. The amendment also gives the council authority to issue bonds or warrants wherewith to refund paving bonds now outstanding.

MEDFORD SUNDAY AT LITHIA PARK AUGUST 20
August 20th will be Medford Sunday at Ashland, the attracting feature will be a concert given by the Medford band at Lithia park. The band will be accompanied by probably the largest contingent that has yet invaded Ashland on a Sunday. The week's engagement offered the band by the Chetco Carnival association will not be accepted, as the members would find it difficult to leave their employment. It may be astonishing to learn that during the past three months of the concert season, the band has rehearsed and submitted to the public no less than one hundred selections, overtures, etc. This amount has had to be worked up in order to give the programs variety. The average amateur musical organization usually rehearses the same program over and over for weeks before offering it to the public. Our band has not the time or privilege to do this; week after week they offer at the City park a complete change of program.
Next week Bandmaster Rowland and his musicians promise to even surpass the efforts of the last week's performance which was pronounced the best of the season. The program will include works of such masters as Franz von Supper, Arthur Sullivan, Johann Strauss, John Philip Sousa. The popular opera "Mikado" will also be heard at one of the next concerts given by the band.
AWFUL SACRIFICE OF LIFE ON EAST BATTLE FRONT
BERLIN, Aug. 12.—The correspondent of the evening Am Mittag, at Austrian headquarters describes the enormous losses of the Russians during the summer offensive. The correspondent says the Russian censorship passed the statement that as many as 75 trains loaded with wounded were moved daily on the line of Kiev alone. Basing his estimate partly on the official list kept at Kiev, the correspondent places the Russian killed or wounded in the summer offensive at three quarters of a million men. General Brussiloff's plan of operation, the correspondent adds, reckoned on heavy losses and three or four reserve battalions

During the night the French organized their new positions north of the river. Reconnoitering parties entered the wood east of Hem station, where numerous bodies of Germans were found.
On the Verdun front two German attacks in the vicinity of Fleury were repulsed. The artillery was active in the region of Vaux, Chapitre and Chemis.
On British Front.
LONDON, Aug. 12.—A strong infantry attack was delivered last night by the Germans on the Somme front north of Pozieres. According to an announcement from the war office today this attack was repulsed with heavy losses to the Germans.
The announcement follows:
"The enemy renewed his efforts to recapture trenches we lately wrested from him on the high ground north of Pozieres, by delivering a strong infantry attack yesterday evening, supported by heavy artillery fire. This attack was repulsed with heavy loss, and nowhere else did he succeed in breaching our positions."
