Initiative petitions are in circulation for a special election to pass upon city charter amendments. One provides for abolishment of the park board and the springs water commission, a new board to be elected which shall take over the duties of both, the officials to be three and salaried, the second implies a levy of \$12,000 per year for five years as a specific fund for upkeep of parks and defraying publicity expenses. Minor provisions follow, but the foregoing are main ones.

Dr. T. B. Ford, superintendent of the Salem district of the Methodist conference, who has been visiting in Ashland for some days past, received word early Tuesday of the sudden death of his wife at Salem, and left for his home there on Tuesday morning.
