The fourth Greek army corps, which had divisions at Seres, at Kavala and also at Drama, fell back before the Bulgarians, who are advancing into eastern Macedonia. The Bulgarians have occupied Hermandi and have crossed the Nestos (Mesta) river and advanced to Kavala. These developments are considered of secondary importance and the allies take a hopeful view of the success of their plans. In the fighting at Meglen the Bulgarians, according to a dispatch received here, had 400 killed, 600 wounded and 43 were taken prisoners. EXAMINE WHILLOCK FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS The spirit of preparedness that is sweeping the country has entered even Medford and the latest object against which local authorities are prepared is infantile paralysis. The danger of infantile paralysis, it seems is not confined to youngsters and tots, but is a menace to even those of middle age. When C. W. Whillock, proprietor of the Golden Rule Store, reached Ashland, having been on a buying trip to New York in the interests of his firm, he was astonished when he was accosted by an attendant of the State Board of Health and informed that he must submit to an inspection before being allowed to proceed, that he must be searched for evidences of infantile paralysis. Evidence of the dread disease, however, could not be found and he was allowed to join his waiting family, including his grandchildren. SERIOUS LOSS OF LIFE YORKSHIRE EXPLOSION LONDON, Aug. 21.—Serious loss of life is feared as the result of an explosion in a munitions plant in Yorkshire this afternoon, says an official statement issued this evening. No figures on the casualties are given. "An explosion took place at a munitions factory in Yorkshire," says the statement. Full details are not yet at hand, but the loss of life appears to be serious. Assistance has been sent from neighboring towns. "A further statement will be issued as soon as possible. Bombing attacks of High wood were repulsed. Don't Forget The established fruit auctions of New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Pittsburg, Kansas City and a few of the other large cities have set the price upon the cherries and pears of the Pacific Northwest. Every box bought f. o. b. shipping point, and every box sold upon delivery at any of the small markets, where there are not these standard clearing house auctions have had a price based directly upon those of the fruit auctions. To those who fear that selling apples at auction will prevent f. o. b. buying, this season's experience in itself is an answer. Compare the number of f. o. b. buyers of these auction sold commodities with the lessening number of those who buy apples f. o. b. shipping point. Everybody has a chance to speculate in auction sold commodities. Dozens of firms have placed funds in western banks and as each quota of cars arrived, have wired back more funds to buy more cars. Prompt returns from the auction companies have enabled this. The box apples that are sold at auction will not have the same enthusiastic support of the whole trade of the large cities. Except for the few large jobbing commission houses through whom the associations and other shippers deal, the trade will be composed of "Bears," who will not speculate or boost the sales of box apples. Nine out of ten of the firms will buy from the apple operators as they receive orders for them and no faster. They will not boost "another man's game."—(Adv.) Now Daily Except Sunday. EXEMPTS RAILROAD FROM INCOME TAX SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—Judge William C. Van Fleet of the United States district court relieved the Western Pacific railroad today from payment of a federal income tax of approximately \$15,000 on the road's earnings of \$1,500,000 while it was in the hands of receivers during 1915. Judge Van Fleet based his ruling upon a decision of an eastern federal court in a similar case which held that a corporation in receiver's hands is not doing business as a corporation. The Western Pacific earnings during 1915 were not sufficient to pay interest on its obligations. The road emerged from receivership last June under a reorganization plan. WILL DEMAND PEACE RATHER THAN SACRIFICE CROCIETH, Wales, Aug. 21.—In a speech Saturday to his fellow townsmen here, David Lloyd-George, minister of war said: "I am satisfied with the way things are going. I feel for the first time in two years that the snipers are gripping and before long we will hear the crack. Then we will be able to extract the kernel. "I say that we shall see that there will not be another war in our day. The British people have made greater sacrifices than we ever thought possible. Three years ago nobody dreamed that Great Britain would pour millions of young manhood into the battle front. The vigor of our demand must be according to the measures of our sacrifices.
