The king went to the city hall, where he inquired regarding the measures which have been taken to restore the civil life of the city. LONDON, Aug. 22.—British troops on the Somme front have advanced along a line a half mile long in the region of Pozieres, and have also made an advance near the Lepais salient, it was officially announced today. On Russian Front. BERLIN, Aug. 22.—The Russians are continuing their determined efforts to advance west of the Stokhod in Volhynia near Rudka-Cherbachie, but have been repulsed by Bavarian cavalry and Austrian dragoons, who inflicted heavy losses on the attacking forces. It was announced today by the war office.

They then turned their course on their homeward track via Grants Pass, Roseburg, Eugene, Portland to their home; they had been out just twelve days when they reached here and had had no trouble with their auto except an occasional puncture and one blow-out.
