RECEIVERS YIELD \$50,000 ON BILL

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 28.—Warren Olney, Jr., and Frank G. Deum, former receivers for the Western Pacific Railroad company, saved the stockholders \$30,000 today. On the witness stand Olney said: "We were expecting \$35,000 each for our duties as receivers."

"That's all right, your honor, we were going to concede \$50,000 each," spoke up Attorney John F. Bowie for the company. Judge William C. Van Fleet allowed the \$35,000 each.

Claims aggregating \$256,900 were approved by Judge Van Fleet, who said that they were reasonable.

REPEL AUSTRIAN TRENT ATTACKS

ROME, Aug. 28.—Attacks with small force made by the Austrians yesterday along the Trentino front, were repulsed everywhere with appreciable losses to the Austrians, the war office announced.

"An attack on Monte Zeebio," continued the statement, "was preceded by the use of gas, which was rendered ineffective by the employment of masks."

"In the Gorizia area and on the Carso plateau, occasional but persistent artillery fire was directed against the outskirts of the town. Our artillery replied vigorously."

M'ADOO NOT TO COME TO COAST

SPOKANE, Aug. 28.—William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, will not be with the federal farm loan board on its trip through the northwest, according to a telegram received here today. Secretary McAdoo had accepted an invitation to speak here next Monday, the day the board has arranged for a hearing in Spokane.

Secretary McAdoo telegraphed that he had to remain at the bedside of his wife, who is sick.

MEXICAN QUESTION TO BE SETTLED AT PORTSMOUTH

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—Portsmouth, N. H., was agreed upon today by Secretary Lansing and Eliseo Carranza, General Carranza's ambassador, as the meeting place of the international joint commission to settle the border troubles.

HALT ADVANCE OF TURKS IN ASIA

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The Turkish drive towards Persia, aimed apparently to outflank the Russian armies operating in Armenia, is reported in dispatches received here today, to have been held up at Woe by heavy Russian reinforcements. The foreign legations in Teheran, though still disturbed, have not yet fled from the city, this report taken in conjunction with the recent Russian successes at Bitlis and Mush, is interpreted as removing danger either of a Turkish outflanking movement against Russia or of an invasion of Persia.

Women's Republican Committee

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—James R. Garfield of Ohio, who is in charge of the women voters' department of the republican national committee, returned from New York today and immediately began planning the work under his direction.

A woman's national republican committee will be chosen with headquarters in Chicago.

American Fishing Boats Released

LONDON, Aug. 28.—The American fishing schooners Maxine Elliott and Lizzie Griffin, seized by a British patrol boat while fishing off the coast of Iceland, were today ordered released. The schooners will be permitted to depart on condition that the owners of the cargoes of fish in Norway give bonds to insure their arrival at a Norwegian port.

First place counts 5, second place 3, third place 1. No contestant will be permitted to enter in more than two field events and one track event. Provided, that a student may enter the relay race, regardless of class or number of other events in which he may be entered. No contestant will be permitted to enter in more than one class. Entries should be made by the teacher or principal where the schools are in session, otherwise by the contestant himself, who should have the entry signed by parent or guardian. All entries, especially for school prizes, should be in the hands of G. W. Ager of Talent, who has charge of the field and track events, not later than Tuesday, September 12.
