

SERBS REPULSE BULGAR ATTACK STRUMA FRONT

French Make Progress Before Verdun—Allies Bombard Bulgars on Struma Front—Turks Claim Advance and Defeat of Russians in Carpathians.

PARIS, Aug. 30.—Severe fighting is in progress on the Macedonian front. The war office report of today says the French gained ground west of the Vardar river. Bulgarian attacks west of Lake Ostrovo were repulsed by the Serbians.

The announcement says: "On the Struma front and in the Lake Doiran region we bombarded enemy organizations. West of the Vardar we made some progress. Violent artillery fighting continues. A Bulgarian attack west of Ostrovo lake came under the fire of Serbian batteries. The Bulgarians felt back, having sustained serious losses."

PARIS, Aug. 30.—The French launched another attack on the Verdun front east of Fleury last night and made further progress, the war office announced today.

The entente allies bombarded Bulgarian positions on the Struma front and near Lake Doiran. Violent artillery fighting continued in the region of Ostrovo and Vetrenik. The statement says: "There was the usual cannonading along the whole front. There is nothing to report in regard to the operations of last night except a minor enterprise which permitted us to advance to the east of Fleury."

Turkish Troops Advance

BERLIN, Aug. 30 (by wireless to Saville).—Turkish troops are advancing step by step in the Caucasus and have broken the resistance of the Russians, who occupied dominating heights, it was announced today by the Turkish war department. One attacking Turkish detachment, it is said, found a thousand Russian dead on the battlefield.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 30.—The Russians have captured Panker mountain, in the Carpathians, the war office reported today.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Bulgarian batteries were silenced by the British after an artillery engagement Monday and Tuesday, the war office announced today.

"On the Struma front," the announcement says, "hostile artillery shelled the Kopriva bridge Monday and the following morning our artillery retaliated and succeeded in silencing the enemy batteries."

"Yesterday our aeroplanes bombarded Drama station and troops and transports at Porta, apparently with some results."

"On the Doiran front, near Doldzeli, our batteries dispersed an enemy working party."

BERLIN, Aug. 30.—German troops in the region of the Somme river repulsed strong British attacks along a line from Ovillers to Pozieres and between Guillemont and Maurepas last night, says the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters. British detachments which penetrated the German positions at points north of Ovillers and Pozieres were defeated in hand-to-hand fighting.

Unless relief comes quickly the Walla Walla valley will lose half a million dollars worth of prunes.

SPOKANE, Wn., Aug. 30.—The local office of the Great Northern railroad received an order today not to accept any more fruit for shipment. An embargo on perishable fruit will mean ruin to the Northwestern soft fruit growers if it remains operative for any length of time, in the opinion of W. E. Miller, traffic manager of the Spokane Fruit Growers' company.

Within a week the prune crop will be ready for shipping. The Wenatchee and North Yakima districts are just beginning the shipment of peaches.

Pennsylvania

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 30.—The Pennsylvania railroad and its allied lines have placed an embargo on freight shipments, it was announced here today. The embargo affects explosives and inflammables beginning tomorrow; perishable freight beginning Friday and all other freight beginning Saturday.

Walush

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 30.—An embargo on all perishable freight that cannot be delivered by September 3 will be issued by the Wabash railroad today.

Oregon Short Line

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 30.—The Oregon Short Line and Salt Lake route offices announced embargos today on livestock and perishable freight. The Western Pacific has made no announcement as yet.

Northern Pacific

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 30.—Agents of the Northern Pacific railroad were instructed last night an embargo is placed on perishable freight and livestock which cannot reach its destination by Saturday night.

Denver & Rio Grande

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 30.—The Denver & Rio Grande railroad today issued an embargo on the receipt of all perishable freight and livestock which cannot reach destination before 11:59 p. m., September 3. Notice of the embargo has been sent to all stations along the system.

Baltimore & Ohio

BALTIMORE, O., Aug. 30.—The Baltimore & Ohio railroad today announced an embargo on the receipt of all perishable freight which could not be delivered by 7 a. m. Monday, September 2.

Union Pacific

OMAHA, Neb., Aug. 30.—The Union Pacific Railroad company last night issued an order placing an embargo on livestock and other perishable freight that would not be delivered before September 2.

Michigan Central

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 30.—The Michigan Central railway today placed an embargo on shipments of all perishable freight which could not be delivered before September 2.

Delaware, Lackawanna & Western
NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—An embargo effective tomorrow on all perishable food products was announced today by the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad.

satisfactory settlement of their demands could prevent a walk out.

Satisfactory Settlement Asked.
"No power on earth except a satisfactory settlement now can prevent a strike," said W. G. Lee, president of the trainmen.

"We four heads certainly could not obtain a postponement of the strike if we wanted to nor could we postpone it if we received messages requesting such action from every one of the committee of 6646 who were here last week. President Wilson has not asked us to postpone the strike and he understands, as we made it clear to him Monday night, that we now are powerless to act unless a satisfactory settlement is made."

A. B. Garretson, head of the conductors and spokesman for the employes made a similar statement.

Besides conferring with Secretary Wilson today, the brotherhood heads talked with several members of congress at the capitol. The brotherhood officials expected to confer today with Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor. It was said that Mr. Gompers had made no attempt to induce the brotherhoods to postpone the strike and it was thought he would.

Brotherhood officials who expressed confidence last night that enactment of President Wilson's proposals into law would not prevent the strike.

BULGARS CAPTURE THREE FORTS, TAKE DRAMA GREEK CITY

PARIS, Aug. 30.—The city of Drama, in northeastern Greece, has been seized by Bulgarians after a battle with the Greek garrison, telegraphs the Athens correspondent of the Matin.

The dispatch says that the Bulgarians captured three forts and took prisoner the Greek garrison of 120 men and that a number of soldiers were killed. This news is confirmed, the correspondent adds, by refugees who have reached Athens.

Drama is one of the principal towns in northeastern Greece, seventy-five miles northeast of Saloniki, in the district east of the Struma river, which the Bulgarians have been occupying for the last fortnight. There have been other reports of fighting before between Greeks and Bulgarians, but the French war office on Friday last stated the Greek garrisons at Kavala and Drama were still in possession of the towns and had not been attacked. It was announced at Athens last week that Germany and Bulgaria had given a written undertaking to Greece that their troops would not enter Kavala, Drama or Seres.

BERLIN, Aug. 30.—The abandonment of part of Transylvania to the Rumanians is forecasted in dispatches from newspaper correspondents at the Austrian army headquarters.

The correspondents intimate that the central powers will not attempt to defend the entire border, owing to its crookedness and the large number of troops required for the adequate protection of a front half as long as the Russian battle line. It will be advisable, the dispatches say, to shorten the front by abandonment of certain parts of Transylvania.

Modify Embargo

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 30.—The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad company modified its embargo today so that shipments of livestock and perishable goods that can be delivered to destinations within forty-eight hours from 2 o'clock today will be accepted. Yesterday's order called for immediate refusal.

JOHNSON WINS FRISCO BY OVER 10,000 MAJORITY

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 30.—Governor Hiram W. Johnson, progressive primary candidate for United States senator, carried the city and county of San Francisco by 10,275 votes over his opponent, Willis H. Booth, of Los Angeles, according to complete figures on the 575 precincts.
