YUKON TERRITORY WET BY MAJORITY OF THREE

DAWSON, Y. T., Sept. 6.—Unofficial figures on Yukon territory's first vote on prohibition give the wets a majority of only three votes for the entire territory. The contest was to abolish the licensed hotel, the only form of saloon now allowed in the territory.

The mining districts almost without exception voted for prohibition.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, Sept. 6.—Baron von Dombusch-Haddenhausen, the German minister to Rumania, left Bucharest today for Berlin by way of Russia under a Russian safe conduct. Ten years ago the baron was first secretary of the German embassy at Washington.

CORN WEATHER MOST FAVORABLE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—Corn had favorable weather for maturing in the central and upper Mississippi valley during the week just ended, and the crop is fast nearing the point of safety from frost damage, according to the national weather and crop bulletin issued today. The bulk of the corn crop in the northern part of the country will need from ten to fifteen days to be safe from frost damage, which will carry the time to about the average first killing frost date.

Harvesting of grains had exceptionally favorable weather and three-fifths is going on in practically all districts. Haying is making rapid progress in all sections. Dry and hot weather had a permanently injurious effect on sugar beets in Michigan, but the crop is very promising in western states. Fall plowing and seeding is well advanced over the Rocky mountain states.
