PROGRESSIVES DEFEAT JUSTICE SULLIVAN BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 7.—The defeat of Justice I. N. Sullivan for re-nomination on the republican ticket for the supreme court is indicated today by returns from Tuesday's primary. John C. Rice of Caldwell and Robert N. Dunn of Coeur d'Alene, apparently have been nominated for justices. The progressives made a fight on Justice Sullivan because of a supreme court decision four years ago barring the progressive presidential electors from the ballot and also of the contempt case in which the publisher and editor of the Boise Capital News was given jail sentences for criticizing the court's decision and publishing an attack on the court by Colonel Roosevelt. SEEK RURAL CREDIT BANK FOR PORTLAND PORTLAND, Or., Sept. 7.—Arguments in favor of locating a rural credits bank in Portland were presented here today at a hearing held by the Federal farm loan board. General presentation of Portland's argument was made by J. D. Brown, president of the Farmers' union. He said a district embracing Oregon, Washington and Idaho should be created, but even if a larger district were included, Portland was the logical place for the bank. RUSSIANS HALT TURKISH OFFENSIVE PETROGRAD, Sept. 7.—An offensive movement undertaken by the Turks along the Euphrates west of Erzerum, in Turkish Armenia, is said by the war office today to have been repulsed. In the region of Ognoff, where stubborn fighting has been under way, the Russians are driving the Turks from their strong mountain defenses. According to statements of prisoners, the Turkish troops, says the statement, have suffered great losses. The commander of the thirtieth Turk-

ish division was killed. The commander of the second Turkish corps, Fak Pasha, was killed or seriously wounded and the commander of the twelfth Turkish division was also wounded.
