CAPTURED VILLAISTAS PROMPTLY EXECUTED

CHIHUAHUA CITY, Sept. 7.—Julio Valle and J. Prieto, Villa bandits, have been captured near Santa Ysabel, Chihuahua, and executed by government troops, according to dispatches received here from General Elizondo.

Dispatches from General Samuel Santos in Torreon say that Rafael Castro, a Villa general, has approached him with a view to surrendering in return for amnesty. Castro denies, according to the dispatch, that he was implicated in the massacre of eighteen Americans and other foreigners at Santa Ysabel in January last.

LYNCHERS AT LIMA UNDER INDICTMENT

LIMA, O., Sept. 7.—Sixteen alleged members of the mob which stormed the Allen county jail here last week, in an attempt to lynch Charles Daniels, a negro, and tortured Sheriff Eley until he told where the prisoner was held, were indicted today. The list includes several business men. Thirteen of the sixteen have been arrested and are in the county jail under guard of 100 policemen and deputy sheriffs.

It is expected that 100 indictments in all will be returned. "Attaching an official for the purpose of lynching" is the charge against the men. The bonds of the men already arrested was placed at \$1,500 each.

BABIES—SELLS-FLOTO CIRCUS JAPAN SEEKING U. S. CO-OPERATION BATTLE RAGING ON SOMME LINE

TOKIO, Sept. 7.—Expressions of satisfaction regarding the speech of Albert H. Gary last Tuesday night are voiced by the press. It is evident here that Japan is deeply interested in the nature of the United States' general policy toward China, more particularly whether the government would support the participation of American capitalists in the five powers reorganization.

The Times fears the existence of efforts to convince the Americans that the United States has an enemy in Japan concerning China, with Japan determined to thwart American enterprises.

"There is no reason why both nations cannot co-operate," the Times asserts.

SUFFRAGISTS BAR WOMANS PARTY

ATLANTIC-CITY, N. J., Sept. 7.—The National American Woman Suffrage association convention today changed its constitution so as to bar from membership all organizations not in sympathy with the policy and constitution of the association. A report that this action was aimed at organizations affiliated with the congressional suffrage union, or the woman's party, was denied, but it was admitted that it affects such organizations, though not specifically aimed at them.

An amendment making the terms of officers two years was adopted. Another was referred to a committee to report at the next convention.

The annual address of the president was the feature of the afternoon session.
