

BARNUM'S CIRCUS ARRIVES TONIGHT; PERFORMS MONDAY

While the inhabitants sleep tonight a great modern caravan, comprising eighty-nine private cars, will be on its way toward the city of Medford, hauled by four of the massive engines of the Southern Pacific railroad, and will arrive early Sunday morning. The freight of this caravan is the great Barnum & Bailey circus, which gives its only performance on the circus lots at 10 o'clock Monday morning. The circus will be transported from Salem, where it is now being shown.

The first section is known as the "Flying Squadron," containing the commissary (ovens, steam cookers, utensils, cooks and waiters) and the animals, numbering in all more than 2000. The second and third sections, which carry the red wagons with tons of new canvas, poles, flags and bunting, for the thirty-two tents, covering twenty acres of this city's territory. Assisted by 700 men, 40 elephants and 500 horses, "Happy Jack" Shellen, the famous boss canvasman, erects the white tops, in which you will see the show. The fourth section contains the Pullmans, in which sleep the performers and officials of the greatest show on earth.

Monday will be the day of days—circus day, with all the merry-making of clowns (80 of them), the grandeur of the pageant, the gorgeous costumes, thrilling performers, elephants (40 of them), lions, tigers, monkeys and all the other ferocious jungle beasts (108 cages of them); the side show with its strange company of surprising human freaks, the steam organs, lemonade and peanuts and popcorn.

The gates will be open one hour before the performances commence, in order to allow an inspection of the zoo with its many new animals, including the babies—five lion cubs, six young leopards and tigers, four baby kangaroos, all born during the past winter at the headquarters of the circus in Bridgeport, Conn.

The performance starts with the triumphal entrance of the sultan and his queer, Sheherizade, the chief characters in "Persia; or, the Pageant of the Thousand and One Nights."

There will be 1275 persons, a caravan of 35 camels, 500 horses and 40 elephants. The animals will be captured in all of the richness of which history and mythology tell the magnificent east was capable. Ten of the elephants of the leaders of the court will have on their backs robes that have cost \$1000 or more each in material and labor.

But this is only an introduction to the real old-fashioned circus which is to follow. Then the three rings and four stages become alive with special performers, of which there are 480, including many new acts from Europe which are distinct novelties in circusdom.

Space will not permit the mention of one-tenth of the two-hour program of events in air, on the backs of horses and on platforms. The clowns have a hundred and one laughs to the minute.

For the convenience of patrons a downtown ticket office has been established at 214 Main street, where the same prices will be charged as on the show grounds.

NEW MUSIC STUDIO OPENED FOR CHILDREN

A music studio, introducing a radical change in methods of musical instruction, has been opened in Medford by Miss Edna Warner. The Fletcher method, which is used, trains the child to an understanding and appreciation of music in a pleasurable way through a number of games and mechanical contrivances. Through this method, it is claimed, the child is trained in self-expression through a musical medium, getting away from the old methods which were more or less drill and drudgery. The method is indispensable as a review and for solving many knotty problems of music for the pupil who has had years of instruction.

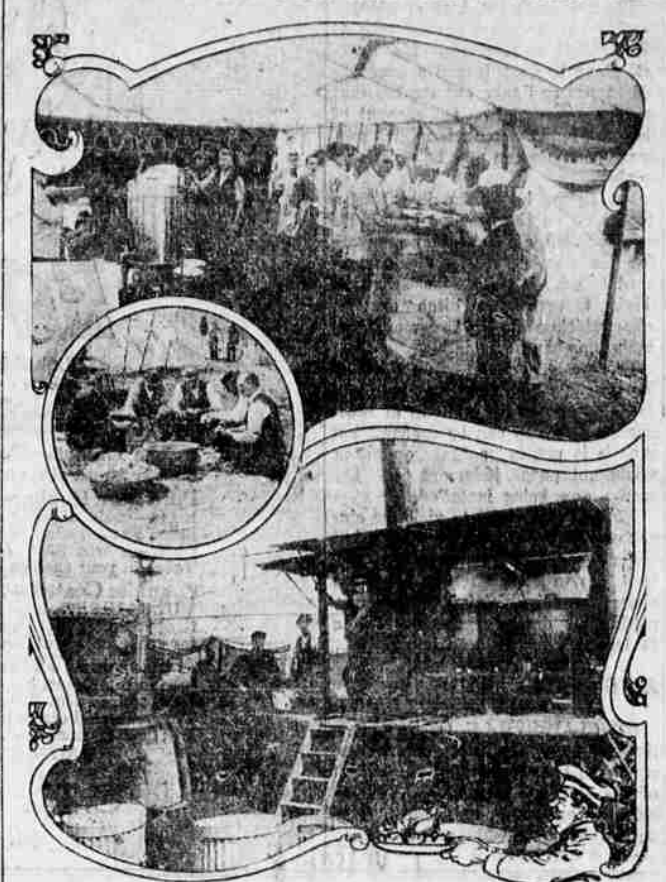
FAIR WEATHER FOR THE COMING WEEK
