FLEEING ALLIES ALLEGED GUILTY OF BARBARITIES

BERLIN, Sept. 13.—The official Bulgarian statement of September 11 says ten cannon were taken by the Bulgarians at Fort Arababla, and continues: "The retreat of the Rumanians, Russians and Serbians was accompanied by the most horrible cruelties, especially on the part of the Rumanians, against the defenseless population. "Since the first day after the crossing of the frontier it has been established that the Rumanian army has committed a series of inhuman atrocities which more and more prove to have been incredibly bestial. Some days before the declaration of war the Rumanian authorities took all cattle without formal requisition. When the Rumanians retreated they formed special detachments for the burning of Bulgarian villages. The villages of Ciskioy, Aitourouvo and Serebarna and others in the vicinity of Turtukia and Silistria are still burning. One detachment defeated near Sansalar, September 7, sent a company with two officers to the village of Serebarna. All the male inhabitants were executed during the night. The streets were filled with the bodies of innocent persons, mutilated in the most horrible fashion. A number of children were burned in locked houses. The women and the remaining children were carried to Silistria. "On September 9 the men of Ah-fah were taken to the bank of the Danube and killed mercilessly. Their bodies were thrown into the river. Inhabitants of the villages of Kalipetrovo, Aitmir, Ctradmar and Dabak were transported to the west bank near Kalnash in order to protect the cowardly enemy from our fire. "On September 10, south of Lake Ostrovo (Macedonian front) infantry fighting was continued from the previous day. Zouaves who attempted to cross the Strama near Nevolven and Kardinos were driven back with heavy losses to the west bank by our counter-attack."

COURT MARTIALS FOR LOSS OF HORSES

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Sept. 13.—The disappearance of fifty army horses and mules, valued at about \$15,000, is revealed here today through the action of Major General Funston in sending to Washington a request that the quartermasters of the first and second Illinois infantry, Captains J. H. Walrath and Fred W. Lang, respectively, be returned here for courtmartial. The officers are charged with neglect of duty in losing the animals, turned over to them when their regiments reached the border. What has become of the animals is not known. General Funston said today he would prosecute every supply officer in the service guilty of this sort of negligence.

FIRES RAGING IN CENTRAL CALIFORNIA

HEALDSBURG, Cal., Sept. 13.—Healdsburg today lies under a thick blanket of smoke rising from the several forest fires that are burning in this vicinity. Thus far no reports of serious damage have been received, though the flames have swept over considerable areas. The nearest fire to Healdsburg is on Mill creek, about eight miles from here. Another is burning in the Geyserville district, near Skaggs Springs and a third near Sweetwater Springs.

GRASS VALLEY, Cal., Sept. 13.—Three thousand acres of brush and timber land have been burned over in forest fires in Nevada county that, starting last Sunday, are still sweeping unchecked over the country. One ranch has been swept of its buildings and others are threatened. Men of the federal forest service are adding volunteer fire fighters in battling the flames.

RUSSIANS HOLD CARPATHIAN GAINS

PETROGRAD, Sept. 13.—The Russians are holding the ground won in the recent fighting in the Carpathians despite heavy counter attacks, according to today's war office statement which says: "In the region of Riga and on the River Dvina the activity of the enemy's air fleet increased. "In the region south of Jescopol (in Galicia ten miles south of Hallee) enemy attempts to cross the river Bystriza were frustrated by our fire. "In the wooded Carpathian region, along the upper course of the river Charny-Cheremosh the enemy launched unsuccessful attacks on the heights captured by us. "In the Baltic, on the evening of September 9, our fleet successfully bombarded enemy trawlers in the Irben straits. Some of them were compelled to run ashore."

ITALIANS CAPTURE TRAVENANZES PASS

ROME, Sept. 13.—Italian troops in the Dolomite Alps, on the far northerly line of the Austro-Italian front, have captured a position commanding Travenanzes pass and cutting Austria's communications between the Travenanzes valley and the Lagazoi region, the war office announced today. The official statement follows: "Minor offensive actions continue in the Arsa and upper Posina valleys. On Monday evening we repulsed attacks east of Griso and in the Zera valley. "North of Falsarego our Alpine troops gained possession of a position which not only commands the Travenanzes pass, but also interrupts enemy communications between the Travenanzes valley and the Lagazoi district. Last evening enemy aircraft bombarded Venice, Portofino, Latisana, Marano, Cervignano and Aquileia, wounding a few civilians and doing slight damage.
