UNITY OF ACTION PURSUED BY ENTENTE

PARIS, Sept. 14.—An addressing the chamber of deputies on the military and diplomatic situation, Premier Briand this afternoon laid stress upon the close co-operation among the Entente allies. The premier reviewed the circumstances leading up to the two most recent important developments of the war, Romania's declaration of war against Austria and Italy's declaration of war upon Germany, and declared: "Thus again confirmation is given of the determination to practice more intimately each day unity of action along the united front. The allies, pooling their efforts in common, combining and co-ordinating them in close collaboration, have determined upon an evolution of the war along these lines. The German empire and themselves reduced to the defensive. The initiative of the operations has escaped them."

WEST WILL AID CITY SECURE LAND FOR WATER SUPPLY

In order to secure the land necessary to protect its water supply, two courses are open to the city. A special bill can be presented to congress, for leasing the land in the O. & C. land grant, or the city can purchase at the price of \$2.50 an acre the land needed. The first step is to ascertain the descriptions of the land wanted. In either case the city will have the assistance of ex-Governor Oswald West, who, as special attorney for the department of the interior, is looking after the government's interest in the O. & C. land grant. Speaking on the subject, Mr. West said: "I can't see any cause for alarm over the fact that several of the parcels of land needed to protect the source of Medford's water supply happen to be included within the lands recently taken from the O. & C. by the federal government. Had title remained in the railroad company nothing would have prevented the sale of the lands to private parties. "There is no question but what it will be the policy of the government to favor the city and protect its water supply, either through the permanent withdrawal of the lands from entry and sale or by permitting the purchase of the same by the city at the minimum price of \$2.50 per acre. "Legislation will be required, however, to carry out this program, and I will be glad to aid in drafting the bill necessary to secure relief. Such a bill would find little or no opposition in congress and could be passed without any great delay."

IDENTIFY METAL IN BILLING'S TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—Work of identifying bits of metal found near the scene after the bomb explosion here July 22, during the preparedness parade, continued today at the trial of Warren K. Billings for murder. Billings is the first of five defendants under arrest to be tried for complicity in the bomb outrage which resulted in the death of ten persons. Many pieces of cartridge shells, iron pipe, bearings, metal fasteners and bits of imitation leather from the alleged suitcase bomb have been offered by the prosecution, but several other such articles remain to be identified today by witnesses who picked them up soon after the explosion. Seventy or more persons remain to be called by the district attorney to present the evidence against Billings. It was expected many of them will be called in rapid succession as soon as the work of identifying exhibits is completed today.

GERMANS PLAN OFFENSIVE

Latest reports from both sides on the campaign in the Rumanian province of Dobruja show the opposing forces in contact along virtually the entire front. Apparently a general engagement is impending. Dispatches through Italy say an offensive campaign in the Balkans has been mapped out at the conference of the central powers now in progress at German headquarters. Germany's contribution to the force being fixed at 200,000 men and Austria's at 100,000.
