HULL OF BURNED STEAMER SMOULDERS

MARSHFIELD, Or., Sept. 16—The hull of the burned steamer Congress was still smoldering today. Last night the fire broke forward more fiercely than ever and it was apparently a result that the vessel is now completely gutted. Her hull is badly warped above the water line. It was considered today unlikely that an attempt would be made to tow the Congress to Seattle until the fire dies out completely as a skeleton crew will be needed aboard during the trip to steer her.

Captain Cousins of the Congress said today he placed no credence in rumors that the fire which destroyed the Congress was of incendiary origin.

"Such a theory is preposterous," said the captain.

CALLAGYERPOULOS NEW GREEK PREMIER

LONDON, Sept. 16.—A Reuter dispatch from Athens today indicates that M. Callagyveropoulos, summoned to Paris by King Constantine, has been entrusted with the formation of a new cabinet in succession to the Zaimis ministry.

M. Callagyveropoulos was a member of the Theotokis cabinet.

ATHENS, Sept. 16.—King Constantine this afternoon called Nicolas Callagyveropoulos, a lawyer and president of the board of directors of the Ionian bank, to Paris to discuss the possibility of forming a cabinet.

M. Callagyveropoulos is a supporter of the entente cause.

FINAL DAY AT FAIR; ANNOUNCE SPECIAL AWARDS

A large crowd witnessed the final day's program at the fair grounds this afternoon. The finals in bucking matches, races and special events were held, giving the most varied and interesting events of the session.

Attendance at the fair has been very heavy this year, 3126 adults and 761 children being present the first day and 3305 adults and 274 children the second day.

The results of yesterday, Ashland's day, races and events are as follows:

Yesterday's Results.

It was Ashland day in the race events. Their entries won the half mile and quarter mile events—the best contests of the day. Wade Hampton, ridden by Arant, finished an easy winner in the quarter, covering the distance in 24 2-5 seconds. Bundy was second and Helen Burke third.

In the half-mile, Arant on Fiddler finished first, beating out Bossie Mills in handy fashion. Sunflower Bell was third. The time was 51 seconds flat. Baby Doll, the fourth entry in the race, failed to start, owing to a broken stirrup.

The winning of these two races on the Ashland visitors in good humor and furnished some excellent sport.

Curley Stanley rode Nero for 6 1/2 seconds before he was heaved. This is the longest any rider has ever been able to stick. A colored boy called "Parson" lasted a tick.

Doc Helms won the goat roping and tying contest in 34 4-5 seconds, being lucky to catch the goat by a hind leg on the first throw. Kubli, the first entrant, was getting along fine until his horse walked away, dragging the poor goat along. His time was over a minute. Curley Stanley won the quick-change race, with Kubli second.

In the cowboys' relay race, the Murphy string of Ashland won the race in 4:26 for the day; Gilson second, time 4:29, and Kubli third, time 4:19.

In the bucking contests Dollarhide on Star made the best ride of the afternoon, his horse tearing away a section of the judge's stand. Kubli stuck to the finish. He made a good ride. Two or three of the other bucking horses refused to buck with any vim, and there were no awards.

Chester Kubli won the cowboy's pony race, with Ray Ward second, and the three-eighths of a mile race for two-year-olds was won by Sarsapria, Lady Slipper second and Dick Turpin third.
