

JACK CURLEY, WILLIARD'S BOSS VISITS MEDFORD

The man who is known far and wide as the "sporting encyclopedia" is in the city.

Jack comes here as an advance courier for the Sells-Floto circus, which shows at Medford, September 28, the most interesting portion of which, as far as the sporting page is concerned, is the presence with that organization of Jess Willard, world's champion boxer, supported by the greatest aggregation of athletes that money could assemble.

Curley says that the circus never has been linked with most of the great gladiators of the ring and mat.

Jack's first actual experience with Gutch came at a time when Fred Heel of Marshfield, Wis., then coming into much repute as a "great little man," sought a match for the title with Gutch. Curley promoted the affair and it gave Gutch his first claim to championship honors.

Few topplers in the boxing game have not at one time or another fought under Curley's management. He has personally handled such men as Benny Yanger, Frankie Noel, Harry Forbes, Dave Barry, "Syracuse Tommy" Ryan, the Sullivan Twins, Jimmy and George Gardner, Marvin Hart, John Willie, Jim Flynn, the Pueblo war horse, whom he still has, and with Tom Jones is a partner in the management of Jess Willard, world's champion.

BELGIAN BANK DIRECTORS PLACED IN GERMAN PRISONS

HAVRE, Sept. 16.—The Belgian minister of finance, Alois von De Vyvere has issued the following note:

"According to news from authorized sources, the German authorities of occupation are pursuing against the Belgian population a policy of spoliation even graver than that already denounced by the Belgian minister of finance after the first reports in the Dutch press. The Belgian National bank is not the only national bank which they desire to reach.

"The German commissary at Brussels demands that a loan be made to him not of 750,000,000 francs as first announced, but of 1,000,000,000 francs of which three-fifths is to be furnished by the Belgian National bank and two-fifths by other banks. "All the directors of the Belgian National bank are threatened with arrest. M. Carlier, one of the directors, already has been arrested and taken to Aix-La-Chapelle, and is being treated with the greatest brutality. He has been forced to wear a prison garb. Such are the barbarous methods of intimidation to which the German government has taken recourse in attempting to insure the success of its forced loan."

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT WILL SPEAK IN MIDDLE WEST

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—Former President William H. Taft, former United States Senator Theodore E. Burton and Henry M. Estabrook of New York will speak for Hughes and Fairbanks in the central and western states.

Mr. Taft will speak in Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas between October 7 and October 14. Mr. Burton will leave Chicago within ten days on a speaking trip through the middle west states to the Pacific coast.

Mr. Estabrook will make a tour of the Northwest states, beginning September 25. Detailed schedules for these speakers will be announced in a few days.

Western Manager Hart left for New York today for a conference with Chairman W. R. Wilcox of the republican national committee.

UNLIMITED FORD FUND FOR CRIPPLED CHILDREN

WESLEY, Mass., Sept. 16.—An announcement that an unlimited fund has been set aside by the Ford Motor company of Detroit to be devoted to the treatment of crippled children throughout the country, who are in need of orthotic or surgical care, was made today by the Rev. Samuel S. Marquis, head of the Ford educational department.

Speaking at a conference of business men here he said the fund originally had been created for the use of cripples in the families of the em-
