

MERCHANTS SHOW AT COUNTY FAIR BEST IN YEARS

The Toggery, M. & M. Department Store and the Model Clothing company last night showed their fall models on the persons of a number of Medford's comely young men and women at the county fair style show at the Davis building. Between style show numbers vocal solos were rendered by Miss Sadie Lacy and Mrs. Guy Childers and Carlton James played a violin solo.

In the grocery section the display of Marsh & Bennett was pleasing with its showing of Rogue River Valley Canning company's products. Wafers and Pep were served at this booth.

Charles L. Schieffelin has a pleasing display with a line of groceries arranged on a black and white decorated terrace at the rear of the booth. The front and sides of the booth were finished in a green and white scheme.

Canned Goods Displayed.
Medford's two wholesale houses appeared with displays of canned products, the Medford Grocery company showing Royal Club brand goods, while Mason, Ehrman & Co. showed Red Ribbon brand goods and Sperry flour.

The Rogue River Valley Canning Co. displayed their yellow labeled products in an attractive booth, showing staple varieties of canned fruits and vegetables and also the bottled Pep.

The booth of the Medford Furniture & Hardware Co. received favorable comment on its blend of dark, rich rugs and tapestried furniture.

The stage for the style show was furnished pleasingly by the Weeks & McGowan Co.

Miscellaneous Displays.
The Garnett-Corey booth was devoted to a display of a variety of Corbin hardware and Diamond tires.

In every booth of the upper floor a telephone was placed by the Home Telephone company. In a separate booth the company has placed a small exchange from which all the phones in the building are operated.

The Golden Rule made a good showing of apparel for both men and women. A feature of the booth was the ingenious use of bolts of cloth for the construction of the front of the booth.

All during the show the booth of the Oregon Central Cigar factory drew a crowd of interested spectators who watched an expert cigarmaker at work manufacturing Mack's specials and Mount Pitts.

Arguments for the starting of savings accounts were presented both in writing and by personal conferences at the booth of the Jackson County bank. Other features of the booth were pictures showing the growth of the bank and an interesting collection of coins.

Electrical Displays.
Paul's Electric Store and the California-Oregon Power company combined in making a display of the latest electrical appliances. Labor-saving, convenience and economy were the points claimed for their products by the salesmen in the booth.

Music for a part of the style show was furnished by Columbia Gramophones in the booth of the Medford Book Store. This firm also demonstrated the qualities of Corona typewriters.

The merits of gas as a fuel for cooking and heating were set forth in the display of the Oregon Gas & Electric Co. Ranges, heaters and water heaters were shown.

At Fair Grounds.

One of the novel exhibits at the fair grounds is that of the Medford creamery, arranged by Mrs. H. B. Clark, wife of the junior member of the firm. It represents Crater Lake and the surrounding section, showing the forest, rivers, roads, routes to the scenic events, etc. The moss, miniature trees, and shrubbery all come from Crater Lake. The crater is made of Medford creamery butter.

The business firms of Medford making creditable displays at the fair grounds are the Pacific Furniture and Fixture Factory, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, Gaddis & Dixon, Page Woven Wire Fence, and Medford Cement Brick and Block Works.

The Southern Oregon Experimental station, by Professor Reimer, makes an excellent display and the Yuba tractor is shown by H. W. Bingham.

The district displays are the best even shown, as is that of D. M. Lowe, representing several hundred different products from his one farm.

N. B. Bennett, of the Eden Valley Nursery, makes a magnificent display of all kinds of dahlias and other flowers at the fair grounds and also at the Davis-Vawter building on which he took first premium. His son, Lester, 10 years old, also makes a display of flowers and vegetables raised by himself, that captured a blue ribbon.

DRY CANDIDATES TO SPEAK HERE AT 7:50 TONIGHT

At 7:50 o'clock tonight the prohibition special train, with J. Frank Hanly of Indiana, nominee for president, and Dr. Ira Landrith of Tennessee aboard will stop in Medford and the candidates make brief speeches at the depot. A large audience seems assured. Efforts are being made to have the candidates speak in city churches Sunday morning, as they rest during the day at Ashland.

ALBANY, Or., Sept. 16.—Attempts of Oregon brewers to amend the prohibition law so as to permit them to manufacture and sell their product within the state were vigorously denounced in speeches today by J. Frank Hanly and Dr. Ira Landrith, the national prohibition candidates for president and vice-presidents respectively. Hoping the amendment will be adopted, few brewers have dismantled their plants.

"Let no one be fooled by this bill," Hanly said here. "Don't believe the assertion that it is designed for the protection of home industry. Instead of weakening the law, it should be strengthened. You can strengthen it by voting for the absolute prohibition amendment, which will appear on your ballot this fall."

By the proposed prohibitory amendment the existent right to bring liquor into the state by permit would be cancelled.

"I may not be able to kill the devil in my lifetime," Dr. Landrith said, "but I won't go into partnership with him. They want to make four per cent beer; don't be fooled, it will make a hundred per cent drunk. The finest scenery in all your western country is your boarded-up breweries."

The initial meeting today was held at Salem. A few hundred persons attended. Stops were to be made later at Eugene, Roseburg, Medford and Ashland. Sunday was to be spent in the vicinity of Ashland.

FORD, MOTORCYCLE BICYCLE, BUCKAROOS REGALIA STOLEN

The theft of a Ford, a motorcycle, a bicycle and a buckaroo's regalia last night kept the police force busy. At 10 o'clock last night Bud Lawrence left his car in front of the Nat. Coming out twenty minutes later the car was missing, and he walked uptown to notify the police. Later Mrs. Lawrence saw the car being driven by a boy 12 or 13 years of age, who, on being stopped, explained that he had made a mistake and taken the wrong car, and then skipped. He is known to the police, however, and will be taken into custody tonight.

A motorcycle belonging to Henry Wolf was also stolen.

During the night a ladder was placed at the rear of the Palace rooming house on South Central and a second-story room was entered and the trousers, some money and buckaroo regalia belonging to Ray Ward, one of the fair performers, was taken.

The theft of a bicycle completed the night's program.

placing each senator in control of all patronage in his state.

This is the issue that Rublee and Woodrow Wilson set out to fight. The senate twice stood by "senator-

ial courtesy." First on May 15, 1916, it rejected Rublee by a vote of 35 to 42, Senator Hollis of New Hampshire, changing his vote from aye to nay in order later to move to reconsider. This was done on May 23, and the vote was a tie, 38 to 38.

In the meantime Rublee continued in his job without pay and rendering valuable service on the commission, and the president has induced him to continue under a new recess appointment until the battle can be fought out again next session.

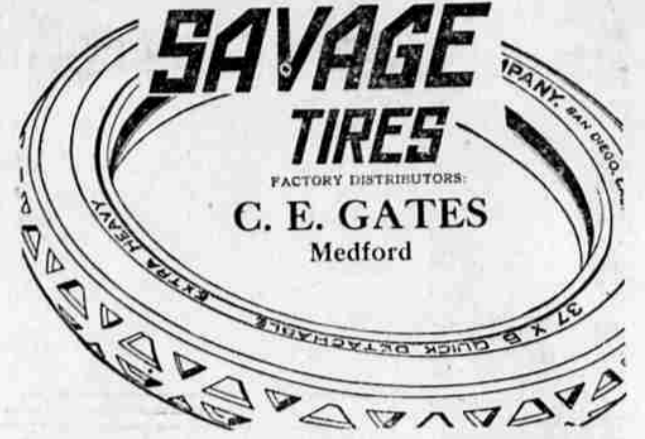

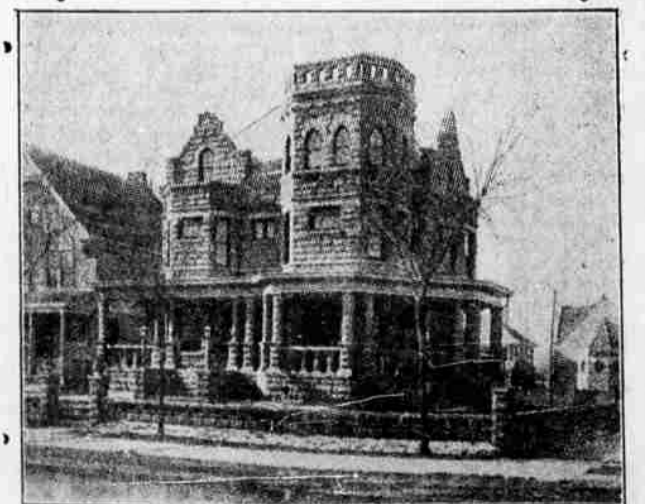
