JOHN R. ALLEN MEDFORD VISITOR

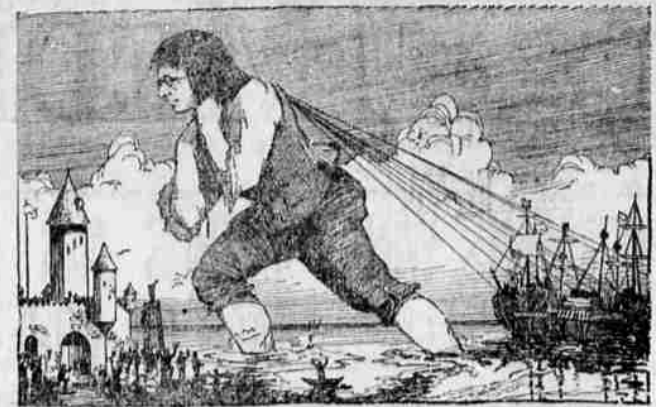

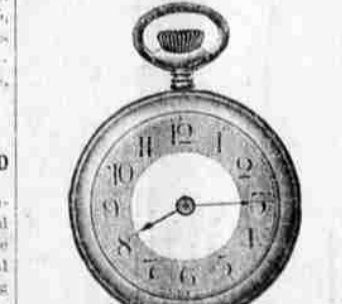
