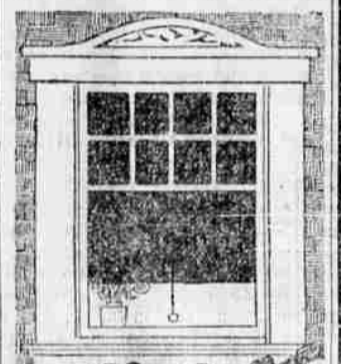

ENFORCEMENT OF MOTOR LAWS UP TO LOCAL OFFICERS

The following communication is self-explanatory: Enclosed please find copy of a letter received by this office today. On account of the anonymous character of the signature, we are unable to answer this communication personally, and in consequence are taking this means of advising the writer, as well as the public generally, that enforcement of the motor vehicle law is in no way vested in the office of the secretary of state, but is, under the law, made the duty of the various peace officers. Therefore, violations of the motor vehicle laws should be reported to any police officer, town marshal, constable, sheriff or to the district attorney. Copy of law enclosed, sections 26 and 27 of which cover points at issue.
