## DRAMA LEAGUE TO PUBLISH MONTHLY NEWS PERIODICAL

At the annual convention of the Drama League of America recently held at St. Louis, plans were determined upon which will greatly widen the influence of that organization. With a paid membership of over 20,000, covering practically all the important cities of the country, its ability to exert an influence on the people is great enough to call for a more systematic line of effort, which is being entered upon.

The first departure is the establishment of a monthly magazine as the league's organ and means of communication with the individual members. The annual dues will also pay a subscription to this magazine which will be mailed monthly from Chicago direct to each member. The first issue will appear in October.

The employment of a salaried executive secretary is another step in advance made necessary by the large volume of routine business developing in connection with the league's activities. C. H. Gifford has been elected to the position.
