THIRD OREGON MUSTERED OUT

CAMP WITLYCOMBE, Or., Sept. 25.—The third Oregon regiment, numbering 1100 men, was mustered out of federal service here today. The regiment was one of the first national guard units to be mustered into federal service on the president's call and was one of the first to proceed to the Mexican border. After being in federal service since June 19, the third Oregon now returns to its Oregon national guard status, with the difference, however, that it will hereafter be under joint control of state and federal governments. Only about 100 men failed to subscribe to the new oaths required in returning to the national guard.

SPEED RECRUITING FOR CANADA'S ARMY

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 25.—More systematic recruiting methods are to be put in force in Canada, it was announced today, to bring the dominion's contribution to the entente allied armies up to the half million quota promised. The present methods have raised 400,000 men. There is to be an additional service board to encourage enlistments, with Sir Thomas Tait as director general. Sir Robert Borden announced today that the national service boards' duties would be to stimulate recruiting and to determine whether the service of any person is more valuable to the state in his present employment or in military service. The board also is to issue badges to persons honorably discharged from military service, to those exempt for physical reasons and to those who are held to be more valuable in existing employments. Stock of labor is to be taken in each military district and the employment of women arranged for.

ZEPPELIN RAID ON ENGLAND DISASTROUS

LONDON, Sept. 25.—One German airship and probably another were brought down during a raid over the eastern counties of England the outskirts of London Saturday night, according to an official statement. One airship was brought down in the southern part of Essex and it is reported another fell on the Essex coast. No reports of casualties or damage have been received.
