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MOST LIQUOR NOT SOLD IN DRY STATES ASSERTS LANDRITH

RATON, N. M., Sept. 26.—The argument that more liquor is sold in "dry" states than in "wet" frequently advanced by the saloon interests was declared "silly" today by Dr. Ira Landrith, prohibition candidate for vice-president at the last meeting of the "dry" special train campaigners in New Mexico.

"Do you think for a minute that if the assertion were true the liquor interests would be fighting prohibition?" he asked.

From here the special train left for Colorado. Meetings were to be held today at Trinidad, La Junta, Rockyford, Pueblo and Colorado Springs.

BOSTON'S LEAD IN LEAGUE INCREASED

CHICAGO, Sept. 26.—Boston's lead in the American league appeared more secure today than at any time during the season, as Chicago, closest rival, two and one-half games away, has only four more games to play.

Detroit, four games behind the leaders, has virtually been eliminated from the championship race with only three more games to play before the season ends. Boston has seven games yet to play, four with New York and three with Philadelphia.

Brooklyn is being pushed hard by Philadelphia for the leadership in the National league, only a single game separating them today. Games yet to be played by the three leaders are: Brooklyn, 9; Philadelphia, 10, and Boston, 13.
