WOMAN'S PARTY INJURING EQUAL SUFFRAGE CAUSE

That the women of Oregon, who won the right of suffrage for themselves, resent the tactics of the woman's party in injecting partisanship and sex into the national battle for equal suffrage is shown by the reply of Mrs. E. H. Frazelle, one of the Oregon suffrage leaders, to Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont's appeal for \$500,000 to help elect Hughes. Her reply reads as follows:

"Multnomah, Or., Sept. 26. "Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont, East Forty-first street, New York City.

"Dear Mrs. Belmont: Your appeal for money for the Hughes fund, dated September 13, is received. I was born a republican and the tariff question made me favor that party for years. Now that the tariff is to be handled by a commission, I must decide for the best man in the future.

"Can't Trust Hughes' Smile I can't trust the Hughes smile. I feel that his promise to the women is only a hollow promise, made with the knowledge that he would not have to sign a suffrage amendment until it had first passed the house and senate; a most unlikely occurrence were the Penroses and the Smoots once more in control.

"President Wilson has made us no answer which he cannot carry out. In other words, he has been perfectly honest with us. I, therefore, prefer to help the cause of one who holds out no false hopes.

"The suffrage amendment we desire to be drafted was in congress when Taft and Roosevelt were in power. They were republicans and did nothing; and Hughes in his promise is only playing for the women's vote.

"I will do my campaign work for Wilson, the honest. In this state the majority of the women are standing for Wilson, and the suffrage cause has lost many of its best workers because of the foolishness of the congressional union and the woman's party in trying to throw the Oregon women's vote to Hughes.

"Injuring the Cause You are definitely injuring the cause of suffrage among Oregon women. We will never again work together as we did before this split, which you and your followers have forced upon us.

"You are causing the same split in other states, and, therefore, you have given suffrage the greatest setback that it could be given. It will take at least ten years of hard work by the sane women to overcome the blow you have given suffrage in trying to force your candidate for president upon us by the expenditure of cash.

"Women, ideal women, want a man to be elected for some better reason than the mere expenditure of cash. Hoping that you and your followers may again return to the real suffrage cause and forget party, I am, Sincerely yours, EMMA HALEY FRAZELLE."

MRS. KEMP TALKS BUTTER AND EGGS INITIATION BILLS

Sunday evening Mrs. Jennie M. Kemp, state president of the W. C. T. U., spoke at the Baptist church upon the important issues of the day, particularly upon some of the amendments to be voted upon by the people of Oregon November 7, from a mother's standpoint.

Mrs. Kemp is a pleasing speaker and presents her subject in a clear and concise manner. Mrs. Kemp paid a tribute to the numerous candidates of Jackson county, who spoke by request at the county W. C. T. U. convention. She said they were the finest appearing candidates she had seen at any convention attended this fall, and that she was glad to learn of the prosperous condition of the Rogue River valley, and of the good enforcement of the prohibition law.

Mrs. Kemp spoke especially of the brewery and prohibition amendments. She called attention to the many harmful features of the so-called "nursing mothers' bill," or brewery amendment, and she believes if this amendment was thoroughly understood it would be overwhelmingly defeated. She urged all to vote 315XNo and 316XYes, for the protection of the home and the boys and girls of our splendid state.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS IN PROHIBITION LAW

In response to an inquiry, Section 26 of the prohibition law is given below:

"Section 26. It shall be the duty of all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, magistrates, mayors, marshals, police officers, and all other peace officers of any city, town or county having notice, knowledge or reasonable ground of suspicion of any violation of the provisions of this act to notify the district attorney of such county of the fact of the violation and to furnish him with the names and addresses of any witnesses within the knowledge of such officer by whom any fact tending to show such violation can be proved. If such officer shall fail to comply with any of the provisions of this section, he shall, upon conviction, be fined in a sum not less than fifty dollars nor more than five hundred dollars and any such conviction shall be made a forfeiture of the office held by such person, and the court before whom such trial is had, in addition to the imposition of the fine aforesaid, shall order and adjudge the forfeiture of his said office; provided, however that such prosecution shall be held in the circuit court of the county in which said officer lives or where he fails to comply with the provisions of this act."

BUTTER AND EGGS SOAR IN PRICE

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—What are characterized as the highest prices ever known at this season of the year for butter and eggs at Chicago prevailed here today, according to reports from merchants. Extras in creamery butter sold at from 38 to 40 cents a pound, as against 27 cents a year ago for the same grades. Eggs retailed around 37 cents a dozen, the same classification selling a year ago at 23 1/2 to 24 cents.

Cheese dealers reported American cheese selling at 20 to 21 1/2 cents a pound, against 13 1/2 to 14 1/2 cents a year ago. Other food products showed as much or more appreciation in value, a notable instance being potatoes, which jobbed at \$1.45 a bushel, as against 48 cents a year ago.

AEROPLANES ACTIVE AT SCOTTISH PORT

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Unusual activity of aeroplanes and submarines at the port of Kirkwall, Scotland, including the use of aircraft as escorts for ships patting to sea, was reported by passengers arriving here today on the Danish steamship Hellig Olav from Copenhagen via Kirkwall, where the ship put in.

According to several of the passengers, the harbor was crowded with undersea boats flying the British flag. Dozens of aeroplanes were darting about and hovering 500 feet over the city was a captive balloon. When the Hellig Olav left port she was accompanied for about twenty-five miles by an armored aeroplane, the aviator keeping close to the ship and making a careful search of the water ahead of her.

SYMPATHETIC STRIKE IN NEW YORK FAILS

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Satisfied that there is little further danger of violence in the subway as a result of the street railway strike, the police department today withdrew all policemen from strike duty on the underground trains.

Similar action soon will be taken with regard to the elevated trains. Only one policeman instead of two hereafter will be assigned to each surface car.

Shortly after the announcement three trains were attacked. A bullet fired at an elevated train clipped a piece from the ear of a passenger.

GERMANY PLANS FOR LARGE TRADE WITH AMERICA

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—Germany will be ready for any trade war her enemies may wage against her after the end of hostilities in the field, says General Henry H. Morgan, United States consul general at Hamburg, who has just returned from his post. The general said that Germany expects America to be her closest trade associate after the war, and that the German business men are confident there will then be only the most friendly business relations between the two nations.

"Germany realizes that her trade with the nations of the allies will be subject to great restrictions," he said. "Regardless of feelings that have been engendered by the war, Germany expects cordial trade relations with the United States."

He said Germany had sent little money out of the country for war expenses as compared to what the allies had sent to America, and that the German store of gold will have a tendency to prevent any crippling of her ability to meet England in a struggle for world trade.

OKUMA CABINET RESIGNS; KATO TO BE NEW PREMIER

TOKIO, Oct. 3.—The Nichi Nichi Shimbun in an extra edition announces that the cabinet of Premier Count Okuma has decided to resign. The premier is said to have stated that he would recommend to the emperor the appointment of Viscount Takanki Kato as his successor.

The Okuma cabinet was formed in August of last year. Its resignation had been expected for several months. It was forecast by the premier in a speech last May in which he indicated he would retire in favor of Viscount Kato.

The premier's advanced age—he is 78 years old—has been given as the reason for his decision to resign, although it has also been intimated he would withdraw to make way for a man of bolder national policy. The premier largely controlled the foreign policy of his country, and has been assailed by the opposition for not adopting a more ambitious attitude toward China.

On occasions he has expressed a friendship for the United States and in an interview several months ago he said the rupture of friendly relations between his country and the United States was impossible. Viscount Kato has served as for-

eight minister and ambassador to Great Britain. He took a prominent part in the negotiations which followed the presentation of the twenty-one Japanese demands on China, and also in the discussion with Washington of the California anti-alien land law.

CHOLERA EPIDEMIC RAGING IN TOKIO

TOKIO, Sept. 12.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The most important development in the cholera situation in Japan is its appearance in the capital of Tokio, where about eighty cases have appeared, thirty of them fatal. The disease is also on the increase in the city of Saka, and has broken out in other parts of Japan, including the summer resort at Karuizawa. Urgent precautions have been taken everywhere.

The total number of cases throughout Japan since the beginning is believed to be about 3000, though the official figures are no longer announced by the home department. This is attributed to a desire not to unnecessarily alarm the population. It was also stated in the Japanese press that the officials did not wish the impression to go abroad that Japan was affected with a serious cholera epidemic, for the officials believed they had the situation well in hand.

GIRL OFFERS EYE TO AID FRANCE

PARIS, Oct. 3.—A young English girl has written to Dr. Rochon Davigneaud, offering to give one of her eyes to a soldier who has lost his sight serving France. The girl, who lives in North Shields, has read a recent statement by Dr. Davigneaud, one of the most famous oculists in France, that it was possible to save the sight of a man wounded in the eye by grafting a portion of the cornea of another person. In her letter she said:

"If you believe that there is one chance of success in a million I will give you one of my eyes for a soldier who has lost his sight serving France. I would prefer to give my eye to one to whom it would be especially useful, such as an inventor or an officer of great value."
