

MEDYNSKI PLAN AGAIN PRESENTED TO CITY COUNCIL

Consideration of the new plan worked out by the council for the solution of Medford's paving problem was blocked at the session last night when a communication from Earl Fehl, threatening receivership for the city in case either of the new plans were passed, and a petition containing 400 signatures initiating the revised Medynski plan, were presented to the city fathers. Under the rules of business, this petition must now be disposed of before any other plan may be considered.

It was decided to defer action until an adjourned meeting next Monday night. However, an unofficial meeting was held at the Medford hotel this morning, at which means of reaching an agreement on some plan was discussed. No definite action was taken.

The filing of the petition will mean that Medford will again vote on the Medynski plan. It is possible, according to one of the councilmen, to present a new plan at once and submit it to the voters with the revised Medynski plan. Voters may then vote yes or no on both plans. Such action is not advisable, however, as it is improbable that either would receive a large enough majority for passage.

After the transaction of the regular monthly business, Acting Mayor Hargrave appointed the following budget committee: A. H. Miller, Delroy Getchell, L. L. Calhoun, H. U. Lumsden, C. W. McDonald and C. A. Knight.

J. T. Gagnon of the Trail Lumber company was granted 2000 gallons of water daily, free for one year, for the operation of the company sawmill. In the past it has been the practice of the council to grant water free to new enterprises within the city limits. The Trail Lumber company's mill has operated occasionally for several years.

City Engineer Arnsperger was instructed to remove the poplar trees in the city park that have been giving trouble by clogging up water mains. Fire Chief Lawton asked the council to draft an ordinance giving him authority to inspect flues and fireplaces in private residences so as to prevent needless fire loss. The ordinance will be drawn and acted upon at the next meeting.

JUDGE WITHINGTON PASSES AWAY; END COMES SUDDENLY

Holbrook Withington, for the past ten years one of the best known and popular residents of Medford, died at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, October 4, at the Sacred Heart hospital, aged 42 years, from a complication of diseases from which he had suffered for the past year. The end was due to heart failure and came suddenly, as only last Saturday he was able to visit about town.

Mr. Withington was the son of a pioneer of Portland, the late J. H. Withington, organizer and for thirty years cashier of the First National bank of Portland, and a grandson of the late Amory Holbrook, one of the distinguished pioneers of Oregon. He was born on the site of the present Chamber of Commerce building in 1874, attended the Portland public schools and graduated from the state university at Eugene. He was admitted to the bar and practiced at Portland and Port Orford, coming to Medford in 1905.

Mr. Withington was city attorney for Medford in the days when the village was developing into the city, and later for Central Point, Eagle Point and other municipalities. He was attorney for the Pacific & Eastern railroad and organized most of the corporations doing business here. He had fine legal ability and might have led his profession.

Mr. Withington, or "Judge," as he was familiarly called, had an extended acquaintance throughout the state. He had a natural talent for the stage and no amateur performance was complete without him. He had a gift of story-telling that won him wide popularity. He was a friend to every one, beloved by many and is mourned by all.

He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Hamilton Abbott of Vancouver, B. C., who is en route to Medford, and Miss Mary Withington of Washington, D. C.

CHINESE PARLIAMENT REJECT MONARCHIST

L. & N. EXPOSE IS ORDERED BY COURT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Justice Stafford of the District of Columbia supreme court rendered a decision today requiring Milton H. Smith, president, and other officials of the Louisville & Nashville railroad to answer questions propounded by the inter-state commerce commission regarding its political contributions.

The court held the commission has the right to know about such con-

tributions, not because of their political nature, but because they affect questions of the reasonableness of rates. Mr. Smith refused several months ago to answer questions of Joseph W. Folk, counsel for the commission in an inquiry into the affairs of the Louisville & Nashville and Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis railroads based upon a senate resolution.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Major General Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff of the army, is undergoing treatment at a hospital here for chronic stomach trouble. It was said at the war department today that the general was improving and that an operation was not deemed necessary.

TELLS TROOPS TO GO TO VICTORY

LONDON, Oct. 4.—"According to German newspapers," says a Reuter dispatch from Amsterdam today, "General Von Falkenhayn has issued to the 'victors' of Rothenthurn pass the following army order:

"Express to all the troops which participated in the battle at Rothenthurn my sincere recognition of their brilliant deeds. A numerically superior enemy was as good as annihilated and the remnants are still cowering about the mountains and will not escape their deserved fate. The weak portion which fled to Rumania on hidden paths cannot longer be called troops.

"May it so happen with all our enemies. Go forward to new deeds and new victories for all that is dear to us."
