

### CHAMBERLAIN AT NATATORIUM NEXT TUESDAY

Senator George E. Chamberlain will start on a tour of the state in the interest of President Wilson's campaign for re-election, commencing Monday, October 9, at Ashland, and closing Wednesday, November 1, at Baker.

Evening meetings will be held at each place visited, with the exception of Albany, where the senator will make an address in the forenoon, going on to Springfield for a rally in the evening of October 14.

Senator Chamberlain will speak at the Natatorium, Medford Tuesday evening, October 10.

Senator Chamberlain's itinerary as mapped out is as follows: Ashland, October 9; Medford, October 10; Grants Pass, October 11; Roseburg, October 12; Eugene, October 13; Albany, forenoon, October 14; Springfield, evening, October 14; Marshfield, October 16; Corvallis, October 18; Dallas, October 19; McMinnville, October 20; Hillsboro, October 21; Salem, October 22; Oregon City, October 24; Astoria, October 25; Hood River, October 26; The Dalles, October 27; Pendleton, October 28; Umatilla county, October 29-30; La Grande, October 31; Baker City, November 1.

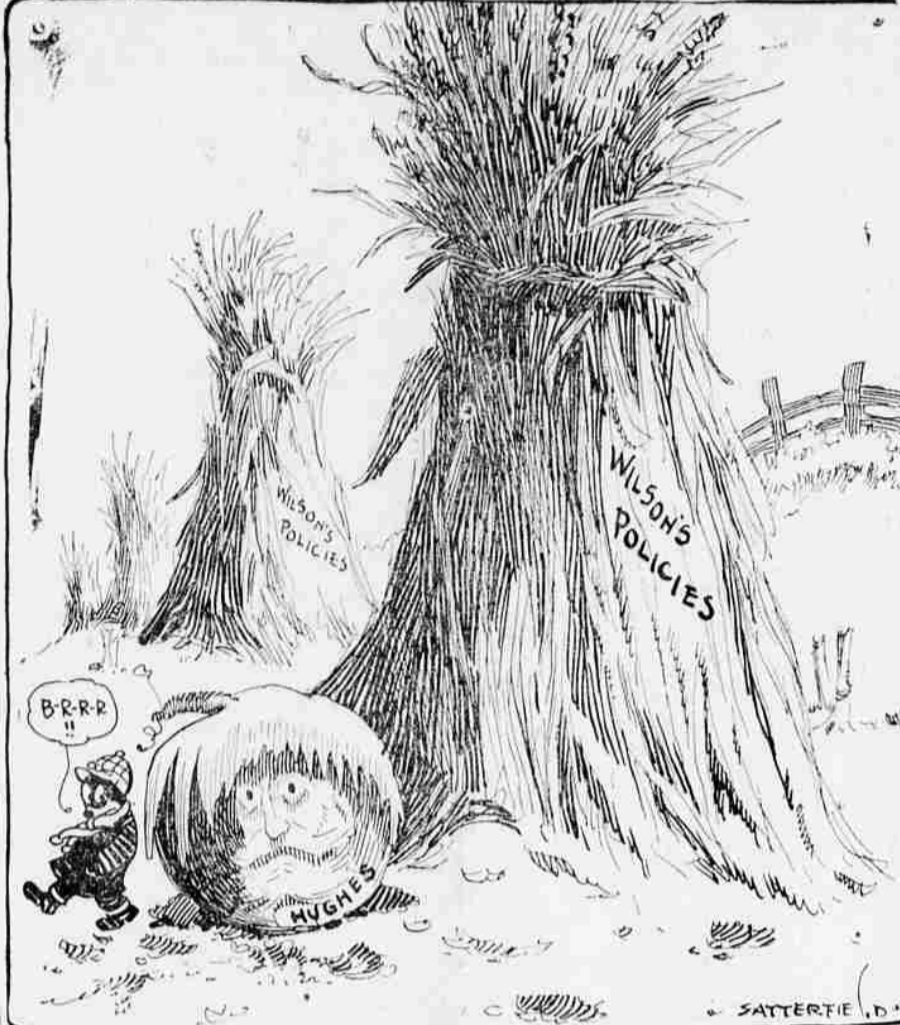
The big free musical show is here and all ready. This show comprises 20 people and, from appearance, they sure look like real entertainers.

### FRENCH CAPTURE NINE GERMAN GUNS

PARIS, Oct. 5.—In the course of their advance on the Somme front, east of Morval, yesterday, the French captured nine 3½-inch guns, the war office announced today.

The statement follows:  
"The night was calm on the entire front. During our advance east of Morval we captured nine guns of 88 millimeters (3½ inches)."

"Notwithstanding the very bad weather our airmen bombarded the aviation grounds at Colmar. In a night flight ninety bombs were dropped on searchlights and military buildings at Zebrugge."

### FOOD PRODUCTS INCREASE IN PRICE THROUGH COUNTRY

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—The price of standard Minnesota patent—the high-grade family flour—was advanced 20 cents a barrel to \$9.30 today, the second advance within ten days.

The same grade of flour sold for \$5.90 a barrel a year ago. Two weeks ago it was selling for \$8.90.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 5.—Sugar was selling at \$7.20 per 100 pounds wholesale and \$7.70 retail here today, after making a second advance in price within a week, the first increase being 15 cents per hundred pounds and the latest 10 cents.

An increase of 20 cents a barrel for California flour to \$7.60 and a boost to 42 cents a dozen wholesale for first quality eggs also added to the increased cost of living here. Retail dealers predicted eggs would reach the 70-cent mark within a few months.

CHICAGO, Oct. 5.—Wheat prices ran up today to a new high level for 1916 on announcements that the drought in Argentina remained unbroken. The opening, which ranged from the same as yesterday's finish to 1 cent higher, with December at \$1.59½ to \$1.60½ and May at \$1.58½ to \$1.59½, was followed by only a moderate reaction from the initial top prices.

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The high price of food continued to show its effect today in the prices charged by restaurants and boarding houses of nearly every class. Few of the more expensive eating places have raised their charges, but several have adopted the European custom of imposing a convert fee, which means that the prospective diner pays 10 cents or more for the seat he occupies at a table.

Several of the popular price lunch-rooms have followed the example of the corporation which operates the largest chain of dairy restaurants in the city, and added 5 cents to the price of most of their regular dishes.

The county court Thursday denied the petition for the division of the consolidated school district at Wimer, granted a petition for a new district east of Central Point, and re-established school district No. 75 at the Westerlund orchards. An appropriation of \$250 was allowed for cooperation in gravelling the new county road, leaving the Pacific Highway at the Taylor place.
