TROOPS TO REMAIN ON MEXICAN BORDER

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 12.—There is no immediate prospect for state troops on border duty to return home other than the organizations already under orders. General Funston made this clear today by pointing out that all national coast troops remaining in state mobilization camps have been ordered out and are taking the place of an equivalent number that have been on duty for several months.

Troops not relieved in this exchange must remain indefinitely in mobilization, unless the war department changes its policy and decides to decrease the strength of the border patrol.

ALLIED ADVANCE MEETS REPULSE

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—A new attempt of the French and British on a large scale to break through our line between the Aisne and the Somme failed completely. The enemy employed massed artillery and infantry reinforced with fresh reserves in the effort to achieve his object. The troops of Generals Sarrail, Van Arman, Von Boehn and Von Fiermer maintained their positions unshaken after heavy fighting.

The main weight of the numerous attacks was directed against the front from Courcellette to St. Pierre Vaast wood. Bitter hand-to-hand fighting developed repeatedly in our lines with those of the enemy, who temporarily penetrated our position. In spite of assaults during the day against our positions near Sully, which failed on six occasions, the French attacked once again in the course of the night. This attack also was repulsed. The battle northwest of the village has not been concluded.
