### STRAW VOTES GIVE WILSON BIG LEAD ABOUT MEDFORD

That Medford is overwhelmingly for Wilson was shown again Saturday, when Robert Dutton of 1022 W. Tenth street, took a straw vote on Main street. Starting down at Fir street, to Riverside, he asked everyone he met, returning on the other side of the street. A total of 421 votes were polled, Wilson receiving 285, Hughes 44, Benson, socialist, 1, and Handy, prohibitionist 1.

That the sentiment among the women for Wilson is even stronger was shown by a straw vote taken at the College Women's Club Saturday. Twenty-six ladies were present, and Wilson received 20 votes, Hughes 6.

Straw votes at the orchards show the strong Wilson sentiment. Out of 32 women pickers at Vernalis station, out of 76 pickers 74 were for Wilson in the Pepper and Taylor orchard, out of 76 pickers, 14 were for Wilson and 2 for Hughes. At Bear Creek orchard, out of 20 pickers, 19 are for Wilson and 1 for Hughes.

Every resident of Butte Falls turned out to hear Messrs. Neff and Kelly speak upon political issues at Butte Falls Saturday evening.

A local orchestra furnished music while the frequent applause of the audience showed the strong Wilson sentiment. E. A. Hildreth acted as chairman of the meeting. Messrs. Neff and Kelly speak at Jacksonville Tuesday evening.

### MEDFORD PLAYS KLAMATH FALLS 13-13 TIE GAME

The Medford-Klamath Falls football game, played in the latter city last Saturday, resulted in a 13-13 tie. Overconfidence on the part of the Medford and heady scrappiness on the part of the Klamath aggregation accounts for the evenness of the game.

In the first quarter Medford received the ball, and on an exchange of punts gained fifteen yards. Line plunges by Calloun and Gentry carried the ball to the Klamath five-yard line, where the ball was lost on downs. Klamath's kick was blocked by Billy Mitchell, who fell on the ball behind the goal line, scoring the first touchdown for Medford. Medford again received, and after plunging straight down the field by the Medford backs, Gentry carried the ball over for the second touchdown.

In the second quarter a fumble by Medford gave the ball to Klamath, and with two wide end runs Klamath scored, making the game stand 13-7 in favor of Medford.

The third quarter was even, both sides fighting hard, and neither able to gain any advantage.

In the fourth quarter a bombhead attempt at a forward pass by the Medford captain and quarterback on their own fifteen-yard line gave the ball and a touchdown to Klamath, tying the score. Time alone saved Medford from defeat, for at the blow of the whistle Klamath Falls had carried the ball again to the Medford five-yard line.

Medford in the beginning played good ball, but once their confidence was shaken lost their team play and aggressiveness. Calloun and Gentry were consistent ground-gainers throughout the game. Billy Mitchell also showed up consistently, playing the best defensive game.

As a result of the showing made, shakiness in the organization is expected during the week. Normale is out for practice and will probably displace one of the present first squad. A number of the youngsters will also be given a chance over the veterans.

The officials at the game had considerable difficulty in controlling the crowd and keeping them off the field, which was avoided. One Medford

player was injured by being knoed in scrimmage.

Stuart Torney and Eugene Narreagan, former Medford high school students, walked from Clason, where they are working, to Klamath Falls, a distance of forty miles, in order to see the game.
