

HUGHES DECLARES 8 HOUR LAW IS BLOW TO FARMERS

HASTINGS, Neb., Oct. 16.—Charles E. Hughes today told a crowd of farmers here that the democratic administration had ignored the agricultural interests of the country in urging the enactment of the Adamson law. The nominee, in support of his contention, cited a telegram from President H. N. Pope of the Texas Farmers' union to President Wilson, requesting that the farmers be permitted to submit data in arbitration proceedings between the railroads and the brotherhoods.
