LOW SUGAR RATE GIVEN PASS FACTORY

SALEM, Or., Oct. 21.—The Oregon public service commission today granted the application of the Southern Pacific company for permission to establish a rate of 15 cents for 100 pounds of sugar in carload lots, with a minimum weight of 60,000 pounds, from Grants Pass to Portland. The order also applies to other points on the Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, except that the rate will be governed by adding a 10-cent arbitrary at a minimum weight of 30,000 pounds to the present local rate on sugar from Portland to these intermediate points.

The establishment of the new rates on sugar, the commission found after an investigation, was necessary to permit the Utah-Idaho Sugar company at Grants Pass to enter Portland and other markets upon the Southern Pacific's lines in Oregon in competition with sugar moving to Portland by water.
