last paying a more nearly proportionate share of the nation's expenses.

"Under Wilson the farmer producer who buys at retail prices and must sell at wholesale has at last a banking right to borrow, as well as other producers, who buy at wholesale prices and sell at retail.

"Under Wilson the men who chain childhood to factory machines can no longer make the government a silent partner in exploiting their product.

"In his public utterances Wilson has glorified the decency of the nation by substituting for class tirades, personal abuse and vituperation the orderly discussion of measures, tendencies and ideals.

"In this great European war he has preserved a true neutrality, as the rabid dissatisfaction of the partisans on both sides attests.

"With changing circumstances in Mexico he has skillfully changed method and counter-check, but never abandoned the guiding principles of helpfulness, charity and justice.

"In this crucial period of the nation's life, the party which is showing unexampled capacity for constructive work and is moving forward at rapid pace must not be replaced by a standpat, exasperated and embalmed endeavor facing backwards, and mounted on a dead horse.

"Hughes says our present prosperity is founded on sand. I agree. Wilson furnished the sand."

STRAW VOTES GIVE TWO TO ONE FOR WOODROW WILSON

Straw votes are the order of the day in Medford, and most of them show a two to one vote for the president. Some idea as to how the women's vote will go was shown at the Woman's Aid society meeting of the First M. E. church Wednesday. Forty-two women were present, and the vote stood, Hanley L. Hughes 16, Wilson 25.

That Wilson sentiment is stronger in the country districts is the testimony borne by county candidates of both parties. No bets of any size have been made on Jackson county, though democrats are offering even money that Wilson carries the county by 750 plurality.

Two bets have been recorded of \$400 each in the past two days on general results at even money, and \$500 has been wagered on miscellaneous subjects, principally upon New York, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois. Betting is expected to be lively during the next few days.

More money is needed by the Wilson campaign committee. No aid is being received from the state or national committee, and a large portion of the money already received has been sent to help the state and national funds, both of which are short of funds. Several rallies are planned for next week and Wilson supporters are earnestly asked to help out.

Tonight at Willow Springs, Messrs. Neff and Kelly will speak on Wilson policies. Friday night they speak at Lake Creek and Saturday at Agate. Previously reported: \$562.60

FIND SKELETON OF MAN LOST IN HILLS LAST JANUARY

The skeleton of Edmund Hall, who was lost in a snowstorm on the trail between Evans creek and Trail creek last January, was found Wednesday evening 100 yards from the mouth of Railroad creek, near the head of Evans creek, by D. E. Cottrell of Beagle, who was looking for cattle in that vicinity.

The snowshoes, rifle and a match box with the initials "E. H." marked on it were found by the skeleton of the deceased.

Mr. Hall had many acquaintances in Medford and was well known on Trail creek. He resided at the home of Scatter Hammond several months previous to his death, and left Mr. Hammond's home one morning in January for a place called Richter's, on Chicago trail, and was never heard of again until the discovery of his skeleton and rifle yesterday evening.

A posse of men searched for several days after he was lost between the two points of his journey, and at one time was near the place where his remains were found by Mr. Cottrell.

SAWMILL WILL OPERATE BY FEBRUARY FIRST

The sawmill of the Applegate Lumber by February 1st, according to an announcement by S. S. Bullis at a meeting of the directors of the company Wednesday night.

The machinery for which E. J. Semon went east to purchase is now on the way and will arrive by the middle of November, the railroad now under construction will be completed by December 1st, a tract of timber has been purchased and partly paid for, and the officers of the Ewauna Box Factory of Klamath Falls, are ready to sign a contract, upon request.
