MEXICAN CHIEFS EMBRACE AT PLEDGE TO FOLLOW CAUSE MEXICO CITY, Oct. 27.—At a meeting of the new constitutional liberal party today General Obregon, the war minister, in a speech declared that there was no truth in the reports of the existence of bad feeling between him and General Gonzales, the minister of communications. He said: "Both of us are human; both have passions and ambitions, but our passions will be subordinated to our duty and our ambitions are fulfilled in carrying out the duties of our positions in the triumph of the constitutional cause." 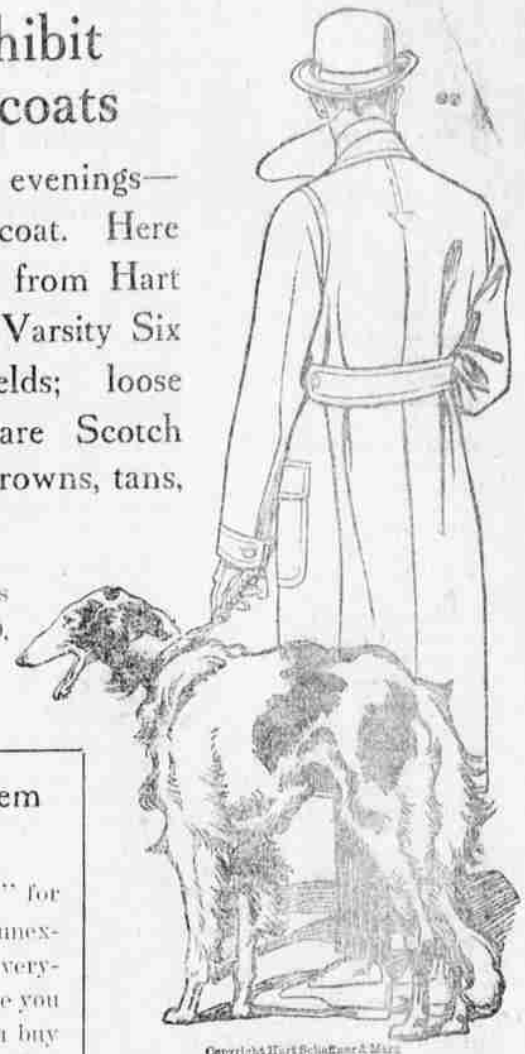
