Mr. Wilson Arraigned.
Mrs. Hanley's talk tonight in Baker was a democratic arraignment of Wilson. This is our last speaking point in Eastern Oregon and interest is centering in the gospel of republicanism as preached by this feminine Sunday.

URGE IRRIGATION FOR GOLD HILL DISTRICT

On November 27th a petition will be presented to the county court calling for an election prescribing an irrigation district in the Gold Hill district which will cover 1200 acres. The north end of the valley is practically a unit concerning the necessity of water and there is no doubt that the election will carry.

It is also probable Grants Past Ranchers will extend their ditch to meet the proposed system which would make a complete system covering about 12,000 acres. The water will be taken from Rogue river about three miles southeast of Gold Hill.

BRYAN DRAWING IMMENSE CROWDS IN CAMPAIGN TOUR

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 27.—What is William Jennings Bryan doing in the presidential campaign? That has probably occurred to not a few who recall the drastic circumstances under which he parted official company with President Wilson 17 months ago. One day with the ex-secretary of state would convince the most skeptical that he not only is interested heart and soul in democratic success, but that he is giving more time, energy and money combined than any other single man to bring about the re-election of Woodrow Wilson.

Crowds—well, the like of them are never seen except when Bryan comes to town. Applause—the kind that rises from the hearts of a multitude, the approval that is accentuated by the audible comment: "He's right! He's right!"

For the great commoner is making a stirring appeal. He touches on many issues, but the one that brings down the house every time is his discussion of peace—the fact that the president has kept the nation out of war. Out in the west this is the issue which overshadows all others, and Mr. Bryan has had such a reception in the 15 states he has already visited as to make him confident that the mountain regions of the west will go solidly for President Wilson.

Four and five speeches a day for five weeks has been Mr. Bryan's part in the campaign, and he has four more states to cover in the next two weeks. He is paying his own traveling expenses.

The Kansas City meeting was typical of those he has had for many weeks. The big convention hall there was jammed to the doors, which means nearly 16,000 people. But it remained for Mr. Bryan to grip the audience with the kind of argument and appeal that he alone can make. He had hardly entered the hall in the midst of another speech when the crowd caught sight of him and yelled itself hoarse.

When the commoner was finally introduced the thousands of people stood up and cheered. Mr. Hughes gets nothing of that kind; even Mr. Wilson seldom inspires such a demonstration. But with Bryan it is constant. And he told me afterwards he had never had such enthusiasm in all his campaign days.

Just why that is may be hard to say; but I suspect he is also making more votes for Mr. Wilson than he ever made for himself. Perhaps his own explanation may account for it.

"I can make a much better argument," he told me, "for the re-election of President Wilson than I ever could for myself. For four campaigns I have been able to talk about promises only, but today I can point to a record greater than any administration of our generation. Deeds are so much more convincing than promises."

NEW HIGH RECORD FOR PORTLAND WHEAT

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 27.—A new high record for the northwest was made on the Portland grain exchange today when spot business wheat bids touched \$1.60 per bushel. There were no sales. The previous record of \$1.59 was made on February 9, 1915. All spot and future quotations were up from 2 to 6 cents.

ELECTION IS NOT PARTISAN AFFAIR SAYS HENRY FORD

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 27.—"This is not a partisan election, and people are not talking about political parties; they are talking about men, and the principles they stand for," Henry Ford said today.

"The majority of the people of this country are going to vote for President Wilson because they have faith in his ability and integrity. It is his ability that the young men of our land owe a great debt to President Wilson for carrying us through critical periods without involving us in the horrors of war."

"Contrast the condition of the young men of this country today with that in Europe. Our people are prosperous and happy; they have cheerful and comfortable homes, and their families are well provided for with the best the world affords. In Europe the ravages of war have torn under the very hearts of the people; Europe's sons are dying by the thousands, while famine and suffering are almost universal in the belligerent nations."

"Let me tell you that the mothers of the United States understand the situation just as well as he men do. Go into the homes of the people, and you will find that the women realize fully as much as the men that President Wilson has not only kept us out of war, but has given peace and prosperity to the greatest nation that the world has yet produced."

OHIO LOST TO HUGHES COLUMN

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 27.—Angus McSweeney, political expert of the Philadelphia North American, telegraphing to that paper from Columbus, says in effect that Ohio is lost to the republicans. His dispatch in part, says:

"Unless the present drift of sentiment to President Wilson can be checked, this state will be overwhelmingly democratic. So extraordinary is this situation here that the republicans are in a state of partial panic. The national ticket is rapidly being abandoned to its fate by the state campaigners, and the fact that Hughes is weaker here than his party is apparent.

JACKSON COUNTY BANK'S AUTOMATIC BOOKKEEPER

A real mechanical marvel is the new bookkeeping machine that has just been installed at the Jackson County bank. The machine is the Burroughs adding-subtracting model and will greatly simplify the work of keeping the bank's books. As a depositor you might deposit \$10,000,000 tomorrow, but the machine would not have to exert itself to enter the amount, add your old balance, subtract your checks and automatically compute the correct new balance of your account. The only time it balks is when you have an overdraft. Then it warns the operator, by the simple expedient of refusing to figure any more without the "subtract" lever is held down, that your account is overdrawn, and thereupon proceeds to print a red "OD" signal opposite the amount you need to get square with the bank.

Heretofore, in posting to the ledger it was necessary for a list of checks and deposits to be entered by hand in order for the bank to properly debit and credit each customer's account. The bookkeepers had to add each list of checks mentally, also had to add all deposits and combine their total with the customer's old balance. When that was done, the total of all the checks had to be deducted from the sum of old balance and deposits to determine the new balance. With the machine all this is accomplished automatically and without any mental calculation whatever. The operator has only to depress the proper keys and touch the operating bar.

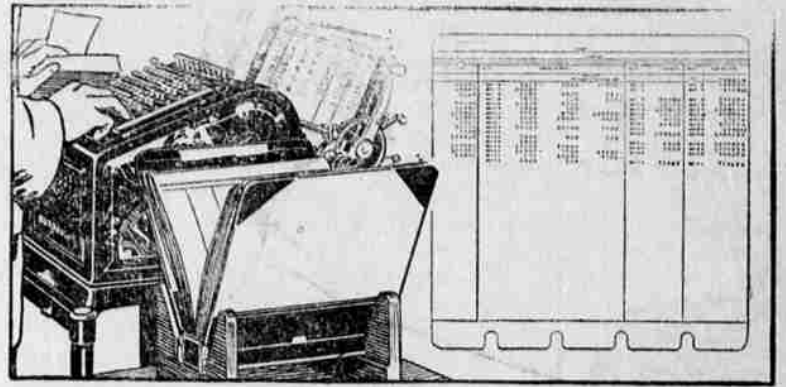
There will be a public demonstration of this machine at the Jackson County bank, Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 30 and 31, to which all are invited.
