CLASH WITH VILLA MUCH MAGNIFIED

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 29.—General Camillo Aguilar, minister of foreign affairs in Mexico, insists in a message received today by the Mexican commissioners that the action between Villa's forces and the government forces near Chihuahua recently has been "purposely magnified." General Aguilar's message is a denial that Mexico City is about to be evacuated, that Mrs. Carranza came to the United States for any other reason than that of recreation, that Mrs. Obregon has left Mexico, and that Chihuahua is in any danger of being taken by Villa.

The rumors respecting the defeat and death of General Obregon, are false, the message continues. "A small detachment connected with the troops of the column of said general was surprised but his slaughter was utterly unimportant and completely lacks the proportions into which it has been purposely magnified."

LABOR WITHDRAWS BOY SCOUT SONS

BOSTON, Oct. 29.—Workmen of the country are asked to withdraw their sons from boy scout organizations in a resolution adopted by the state branch, American Federation of Labor last night. The action came after a report that Charles C. Jackson, president of the Greater Boston Council Boy Scouts, had advised scout masters to prepare the boys under them to "withstand politically the aggressiveness of labor unions," which he is said to have predicted would be "savagely and bitter" after the war. "If this is to be the attitude of the boy scout movement," the resolution said, "it is time the wage-earners of the country should take their sons out of that movement, for the reason that boys and young men should be educated on liberal lines and not on narrow ones."

NAVAL CENSORS WIRELESS STATIONS ARE REMOVED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—Transfer of Lieutenant Charles R. Clark and H. H. Keep, naval censors at Saville and Siasconset wireless stations, respectively, to other posts was announced today by Admiral Benson, chief of operations. The admiral denied published reports that his action was taken because Great Britain protested that the officers had permitted neutral information to go out concerning the recent raid of the German submarine U-53 on the New England coast.

"It is not true that these officers were forced to other duty as a result of requests of any foreign government or persons," said Admiral Benson. "I took the initiative without consultation or direction from any other authority."

The admiral declined to say for what reason the officers were transferred. It was said that only questions of administrative details were involved.

Assistant Secretary Roosevelt announced that Lieutenant J. C. Clark had been sent to Siasconset to relieve Lieutenant Keep. Saville will remain under charge of officers already there until an appointment to the vacancy caused by Lieutenant Clark's removal.

DOLLAR WATCH INGERSOLL OUT TO AID WILSON

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—Charles H. Ingersoll, watch manufacturer, an officer of the Wilson Business Men's National league, president of the Woolly-Wilson Advertisers' league, today made public a statement urging the re-election of President Wilson as the first champion of the small merchant and business man.

Mr. Ingersoll said that the statement would be printed at once in a pamphlet and mailed to many thousands of retailers throughout the country. As a manufacturer who sells directly to the retailer, Mr. Ingersoll has studied the problems of the retail merchant and made common cause with the small business man in his struggle for a fair field.

Political observers see in Mr. Ingersoll's appeal the first recognition of the importance of the man who keeps the neighborhood store as a factor in public affairs.

The statement made public today recites in terse and forcible terms President Wilson's record of accomplishment in freeing business from artificial and unfair competition and leaving every enterprising merchant a fair field.
