

DR. BAILLIE OF PHOENIX IS OUT FOR PRESIDENT

Life Long Republican Gives Reasons for Supporting President—Is the Ablest Statesman of the Day and Truest Friend of the Man Who Labors—Fight on Politics.

"Although I have always been a republican, I am supporting Woodrow Wilson, in the present presidential campaign," stated Dr. J. K. Baillie of Phoenix this morning. "The reason for my support lies in the fact that I consider him the best man in the field, the man best able to cope with the domestic and international problems confronting this country. In my opinion, it would be altogether wrong to abandon a proven leader in this critical time, for an untried man."

Record as Governor.

"I was in New Jersey," continued Dr. Baillie, "at the time Mr. Wilson was elected governor of that state. His record as the executive of that state has never been equaled by any other governor of New Jersey. He has also made an enviable record as president of Princeton, leaving behind him a memory which no man who has attended that university will forget."

Dr. Baillie characterized Wilson as "a Christian gentleman, the greatest statesman of the world, a premier scholar and diplomat, the truest friend of the laboring man." He has visited in the Wilson home and says that his home life was ideal.

Foreign Relations.

"President Wilson's handling of the Mexican and Lusitania situations was masterly," continued Mr. Baillie. "He has steered the right course in regard to our neighbors to the south. There is a family quarrel and it is not our part to intervene, in spite of the howls of speculators. In the Lusitania case Wilson demanded and received both a disavowal and a reparation from the German government. While such a settlement is not perhaps all that might be desired, still it is infinitely better than the other course open, which meant war and shedding of many men's blood."

Dr. Baillie predicts that Hughes will not receive more than 100 votes in the two precincts near Phoenix although more than two-thirds of the 500 voters are registered as republicans.

CABRERA DENIES ISSUING CRITICISM

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 30.—It was indicated today that the American members of the Mexican-American joint commission will take no official cognizance of the statement credited to Luis Cabrera, head of the Mexican commission, in which American government officials were criticized for alleged laxity in dealing with smugglers of arms and ammunition.

Secretary of the Interior Lane, head of the American commission, it is understood, will accept without exception Mr. Cabrera's denial of authorship.

Mr. Cabrera had not returned to Atlantic City early today, but Alberto J. Pani and Ignacio Bonillas, the other members of the Mexican commission, were here and without Mr. Cabrera the joint commission resumed its conference.

the elder Garfield, a poor boy who worked his way through college to graduate at the head of his class, are so interwoven into the life of the old school, and the reminders of him are so many and potent, as to be a part of the very atmosphere itself in which his son lives and works.

Peace With Honor.

"I don't care how much some people may try to decry the fact," says Garfield, "the big result of Wilson's administration is that he has kept us out of war—AND WITH HONOR."

"We are not afraid of war. That has been amply demonstrated. But President Wilson sees, and the people of the United States believe, that we can serve the world and ourselves better by keeping out of war and holding ourselves ready to help in the enormous task of rehabilitation and reconstruction that must follow."

"Our greatest work is to bring the people of the warring nations together in the interest of humanity."

"And President Wilson is the man best qualified to lead in that tremendous task."

"The re-election of President Wilson by a strong majority, too, will do as much as any one thing toward bringing peace in Europe."

What Election Means.

"For it will serve notice on the warring nations that this country endorses the neutrality of its president and will stand behind him in the continuation of that policy. It will remove hopes that now exist abroad that, under a new administration, with the policies of President Wilson discredited, the United States might be brought into the conflict as an active belligerent."

"There is also a domestic situation of equal importance that demands Wilson's re-election."

"We have reached a dividing point in domestic affairs with regard to the relations of capital and labor. Wilson sees this, and by his acts has evidenced his understanding both of the problem and its solution."

"There is another reason, a sentimental or, better a psychological reason, why the American people will not discredit President Wilson and his work by denying him re-election."

Fair Play Needed.

"The American people like fair play. They know that Wilson has served them faithfully, that his attention has been constantly on his great duties and that he has borne willingly and cheerfully the tremendous burden thrown upon him by the European war."

HUGHES HARPS UPON PROTECTION AS NECESSARY

EAST LIVERPOOL, O., Oct. 30.—

Charles Evans Hughes, replying further to statements in President Wilson's Cincinnati speech, told an audience here today that the \$2,000,000,000 increase in American exports last year was due almost exclusively to the demand created by the European war, and cited a statement by Chairman Hurley of the federal trade commission to uphold the republican claim that America "is not prepared for post-bellum competition with Europe."

"That \$2,000,000,000 increase," Mr. Hughes said, "represents almost exclusively the demand created by the European war. What are we to do? There is but one safe course. It is idle to talk about conditions of work; there is no work, and you can't have a lasting basis for prosperity unless you apply the republican doctrine of protection to American industries."

"I was amazed the other day when the spokesman for the opposing party told the people that we were ready. He said in substance that the nations engaged in this struggle are so wasted by war that we need not fear their competition. That is a very serious mistake, if you want to know what the facts are. Let those who speak for the opposing party take the words of the federal trade commission, spoken almost at the same time, as a result of their own inquiry. What is the use of having so-called expert bodies if we do not pay any attention to what they say?"
