ABUSE IS FUTILE

THE Hughes campaign has been conducted on the lowest plane of any since Mark Hanna set out to buy the presidency. Carping criticism, vilification and abuse have been heaped upon the president without stint. His every official act has been distorted and misrepresented. He has been called a coward for not plunging the nation into war, and a weakling for substituting the golden rule for the bragadoon and bluster of might in international relations. Not content with decrying his official record, resort has been had to contemptible whispered scandal-mongering in an attempt to besmirch an upright and noble character—and women, calling themselves ladies, have peddled poisoned gossip to other women—charges as false as they are clandestine.

And now comes Henry Cabot Lodge, premier snob of the senate, who preens himself as a statesman, saying on the stump on hearsay evidence that President Wilson attached a postscript to the last Lusitania note in which the German government was requested not to take the contents of the note seriously. It did not need the president's vigorous denial to stamp the silly charge as an absurd falsehood—but it shows the depths to which the grand old republican party has fallen.

If money can buy the presidency for Hughes, he will be elected. It is being spent without stint. Every large eastern paper is carrying full-page Hughes advertisements—colonies of negroes have been planted in Indiana and other alleged doubtful states. The Santa Fe railroad, the Du Pont powder trust and other Wall street controlled properties are exercising coercion upon their employes in Hughes' behalf. But it is all futile—the people, regardless of party, are for Wilson.

TO PUNISH PATRIOTISM

WHILE it is undoubtedly true that thousands of German-Americans will vote for Wilson, they are probably a minority of the total German-American voters, the great majority of whom will vote for Hughes.

It is equally true that this German-American vote will go to Hughes because President Wilson refused to urge congress to put an embargo on munitions of war and because he forced Germany, by the threat to sever diplomatic relations, to conduct submarine warfare in conformity with international law.

It is not likely that one man out of ten in this country, except the professional German-Americans, disapproved of the president's attitude on either of these propositions or disapproves of it now.

Every man of intelligence knows that even if it were lawful to put an embargo on munitions, to have done so when it was proposed, or to do so now, would be an unneutral act and would mean a rupture—if not war—with England, France and Russia.

Every patriotic American knows that the honor of the nation would have been sullied had President Wilson failed to compel Germany to stop torpedoing ships without giving passengers and crew a chance to escape.

Having refused to commit the country to a policy of unneutrality in the interest of Germany, and having refused to sacrifice the nation's honor and rights in the interest of Germany's unlawful and inhuman submarine policy, President Wilson is now threatened with defeat for the re-election he has earned.

The whole history of American politics fails to disclose a situation which parallels this in its treasonable un-Americanism.

If the professional German-Americans and their co-conspirators, the leaders of the Hughes campaign, including the "hundred per cent candidate" himself, succeed in defeating the president on this issue (Hughes' chief reliance is on the German-American vote), it will be proof indeed of the ingratitude of republics.

If the Wilson record as president had been merely one of mediocrity instead of one of splendid achievement, his re-election would be a matter of national duty, in the face of the treasonable efforts of a class of citizens to drive him from office because he has refused to let the German Kaiser dictate American policies.

It is unthinkable that the voters of this nation, who put the interests of Germany, or any other foreign country, ahead of the interests of America, are in the majority.

"Vote-for-straight" from president to constable, the last resort of the partisan politicians, is now being sounded by the Jackson county G. O. P. It is fine advice, inasmuch as local republican candidates have discarded their Hughes buttons in their quest for democratic votes. But the people will continue, as they have in the past, to vote for the best man, as they see it, regardless of politics, whether he be a candidate for president or constable.

TEXAS BORDER SATISFIED WITH WILSON'S POLICY

J. D. Skinner returned Wednesday from a two month's visit to his Texas cattle ranch along the Mexican border near Alpine, and reports conditions there quiet with general satisfaction over the way the Mexican crisis has been handled. He visited at San Diego, Phoenix and El Paso. He said: "There is more excitement here over Mexico than there is on the border. I was all over Texas, but spent most of the time on the ranch near Alpine, where we have a 200-section pasture. I spent a week along the border visiting the various towns and army camps. People in Texas, with the exception of the few having large interests in Mexico, are thoroughly satisfied with the president's policy, and think that he has acted and is acting along the right lines. "I witnessed the trial of two Big Bend rangers at Alpine and there was no more excitement than in a police court case in Medford. The border towns are half Mexican and peace reigns in all. The Mexicans are peaceable and only too glad to be left alone and have the raids across the border checked. "Sentiment for Wilson is very strong along the border. Even the negroes are for Wilson—the first time they ever favored a democrat. The troops are for the president also, and their votes will surprise some of those shouting to send them into Mexico. "Coming back, straw votes were a frequent diversion on the trains. Daily a straw vote was taken, and Wilson had a big lead in all. Only at San Diego did Hughes seem to have anything like an even break."
