AWAIT OFFICIAL DETAILS OF SINKING STEAMER MARINA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—State department officials still were waiting today for Germany's version of the destruction of the British steamer Marina, with loss of American lives.

A news dispatch from Athens last night saying the Greek government had been notified Germany intended to sink without warning all ships carrying supplies to the allies.

Secretary Lansing said today that the United States understands Germany's pledges not to sink merchantmen without warning and without providing for the safety of passengers and crew.

Nevertheless, it is admitted that Germany has always taken a distinct view of the status of armed ships and it is thought probable that she will attempt to inject the point into the present situation.
