THE OFFICE OF SHERIFF WAS A BUSY PLACE

The sheriff's office at Jacksonville was just leaving a rich relief last Thursday when the Record's editor stepped into it. For ten days previous it had been one of the busiest places in the county. Five men had been taking care of the first payment of taxes, a job which in former years kept as high as 12 people busy. The lessened number of helpers is largely due to the efforts of Deputy Carly Wilson, who established the system. The whole matter was summed up by the expert who recently audited the county books when he said: "The sheriff's office is administered with no bustle or confusion. Only expert men are employed in the tax collection and other departments. I have scanned every tax collection and every fee coming into the office and find nothing out of place nor entered wrongly."
