REFERENDUM AMENDMENTS

BECAUSE of more important issues to discuss, the Mail
Tribune has slighted the amendments and initiative
bills appearing upon the ballot. As each voter receives a
copy of the voters' pamphlet, giving arguments of both
sides upon the proposals submitted, comment is largely
superfluous. However, the Mail Tribune herewith pre-
sents its conclusions:

The first amendment is the single item veto, authoriz-
ing the governor to veto single items in appropriation bills.
This is a needed law and should be voted for. Vote yes
on 300.

The second amendment, to eliminate ships registering
in Oregon from taxation, designed to encourage registra-
tion of shipping in Oregon. There is no reason why ship-
owners should be favored over other property owners. It
is special and class legislation. Vote no on 303.

The third amendment, on negro suffrage, is to make the
Oregon constitution conform to the federal constitution
and remove an obsolete clause. Vote yes on 304.

The next measure is the full rental farm value land tax
and homesteaders' loan fund amendment. Like all single
tax measures, it is designed to remove the taxation penalty
from the industrious and energetic, and place it on the
speculative holder of idle lands. It is in the interest of the
poor and is being fought by misrepresentation by every
corporate interest and every upholder of special privilege
in the state. It is the one fundamental reform on the bal-
lot, hence the vigorous warfare against it. It is in accord-
ance with the recommendations of the federal industrial
commission and designed to aid in the abolition of pov-
erty. Vote yes on 306.

The proposed Pendleton normal school is next on the
list. The state needs more normals—needs one in southern
Oregon as much as eastern Oregon. Vote yes on 308.

The anti-compulsory vaccination bill is next on the list.
Vote no on 311.

The bill initiated by Portland grocers to repeal the
Sunday closing law is next. The Sunday law has worked
no hardship on the state and there is no good reason why
business should chase the dollar every day in the week.
Vote no on 313.

The next measure is the brewers' bill, permitting the
manufacture of beer in Oregon. As long as the people are
permitted to send out of the state to purchase beer, it is
nonsensical to forbid its manufacture in Oregon and sale
under the same restrictions as imported booze. With this
measure goes the prohibition amendment, which replaces
the present anti-saloon law, prohibiting the importation
and sale of all liquors. It would be a waste of time to make
a recommendation, as everyone knows how they are going
to vote.

The next bill is the rural credits amendment. With the
federal loan law in operation, this would seem to be super-
fluous. At least, it would be better policy to await the re-
sult of the federal law before plunging the state into debt
for a rival scheme. Vote no on 319.

The last amendment is the tax limitation bill. This adds
another restriction to progress to the many already in our
mossback constitution. It is a reactionary measure and
will bar Oregon from procuring any federal aid in road
building. Vote no on 321.

LEADING FARMER
