

GERMANS PLAN SINK NEUTRALS BRITAIN BOUND

Safety of Neutral Ships Carrying
Neutral Cargoes to Be Dependent
Upon Guarantees That No Part of
Such Cargoes Shall Be Landed at
Any British Port.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—A special dispatch from Amsterdam features a statement of the Berlin Kreuz Zeitung to the effect that Germany has decided to make the safety of neutral ships carrying neutral cargoes dependent upon guarantees that no part of such cargoes shall be landed, whether through British compulsion or not, at any British port. Such guarantees, according to the Kreuz Zeitung, can consist only in formal undertakings by Great Britain and an undertaking will be recognized by Germany only from ease to ease.

This is taken to mean that in event of any neutral cargo or part thereof being landed in England the German government immediately will cease to recognize the inviolability of neutral ships. The Berlin paper implies that the case of the Dutch freighter Bloomsdijk, which was sunk by a German submarine off Nantucket on October 8, will be argued along these lines and it will be contended since the intermediate destination of the vessel was Kirkwall, there was no guarantee that the whole cargo would reach Holland.

The British press also infers from a Berlin dispatch summarized in the Koelnische Zeitung that Germany proposes to sink all neutral ships, whether bearing neutral cargoes or otherwise, unless Great Britain consents to abandon the right to compel discharge at Kirkwall of any part of a neutral cargo suspected of having an enemy destination.

VILLA LEADER SHOT FOR TREASON

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 4.—Colonel Rosario Garcia, Villa commander from Sonora, and two of his men were executed in Juarez early today after being convicted by a military court on charges of treason. They were captured at Hacienda Santa Ana, near Nampiquip, and were brought to Juarez yesterday.

Colonel Garcia weakened when the moment of death came. After marching to the Juarez cemetery in front of a guard of eleven Carranza soldiers and an officer, Colonel Garcia asked permission to write a last letter home to his family in Sonora.

CATE TO DISCUSS TO FRUIT GROWERS WORK OF YEAR

The Farmers' and Fruitgrowers' league have found in the annual report of County Pathologist C. C. Cate made to the county court and the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural college so much material of interest and value to the community that it has been decided to hold a meeting of the league on Saturday, November 11, at the public library, Medford, to hear the report read. All farmers and fruitgrowers, whether members or not, are invited and urged to attend the meeting. In addition to reading the report, Mr. Cate has consented to give additional facts to those brought out in the report on the subject of the control of brown gall, which has led to a possibly still more valuable discovery of assistance in control of root blight; the growing of vetch, some facts of interest to farmer and fruit grower; the use of miscible oil-sprays as affecting blight control.

If time permits, some other subjects of the report will be covered and questions answered on any of the features of the report. The subjects treated in the report are:

- Public Meetings.
- Frost Fighting, Thermometer Testing.
- Soil moisture determination, duty of water investigation.
- Inoculation for leguminous seeds.
- Plant disease investigations.
- Spraying for the prevention of scab.
- Fruit ripening studies.
- Investigation to determine proper stage of development for picking various varieties of pears and apples.
- Pear and apple blight investigations.
- Use of oil-sprays as a repellent to insects.
- Crown gall, control by the application of various material.
- Experiment to control powdery mildew on apples.
- Mushroom root rot.
- Study of disinfectants.
- Codlin moth investigations.
- Blight control vs. insect control.
- Potato tuber moth, inspection and condemnation.
- Dust spraying for codlin moth and scab.
- Collection of insects.
- Farm and orchard visits.
- Demonstrations on farms.
- Office visits.
- Telephone calls.
- County fair exhibit.
- Routine office work.

principal factor in this election. It is everywhere—the approval of Wilson because “He kept us out of war”—but the sentiment is less strong seemingly in the east. In the far west where the women vote, and in Illinois where they vote for the first time for president, this peace sentiment would apparently be sufficient alone to determine the result in these localities.

Next to the peace sentiment Wilson's greatest strength is the labor vote, and after this comes the disaffected progressive vote. Then follow the commercially contented vote, the anti-hypnotized vote, the Jewish vote, the social worker vote, the Polish and Italian vote, the high-brow vote.

West Progressive.

A second reason why the west is stronger for Wilson than the east is to be found in the greater strength of the progressive idea in the west. Progressivism has flourished to perfection in California, while it has languished as it approached New York. The progressive and independent voter, confronted with Hughes as an alternative to Wilson, takes more kindly to Wilson than to Hughes. Hughes is in bad political company. The men who nominated him are the

ancient enemies of the progressive movement and of progressive policies in government. Hughes' own record is much more to the liking of the hard-pat influence than to forward-looking folks. To which must be added the fact that since his nomination Hughes and his political associates have adopted a course calculated uniformly to antagonize and alienate the progressive vote when the one thing necessary if they were to win was to attract and absorb that vote.

Parker Piasco Again.

This campaign has been in its general outline in almost perfect reproduction of the Alton B. Parker campaign of 1904; that year William J. Bryan, having twice tried for the presidency, stepped aside and let the reactionary element of his party assume the leadership. They nominated a “safe and sane” candidate, a judge, and went before the country with an appeal to “save the constitution.” To this appeal, the voters responded with the smallest vote cast for any candidate since the civil war. Parker's opponent, Roosevelt, swept everything before him.

Hughes is obviously traveling the Parker road. Colonel Roosevelt is giving Hughes much the same support that Bryan gave Parker in 1904—perfunctory support.

Sentiment of Four Years.

The result of the election will be

the effect of a public sentiment which has been four years in forming. It will not be the result of the campaign since June. The democratic campaign has been fairly well managed while the republican campaign will stand in political history as an example of stupidity long to be remembered.

The principal mistakes made by Hughes' managers were: Turning the real management of campaign over to such conspicuous worthies of the “old guard” as Frank Hitchcock, Boies Penrose, Joe Keating, Jim Henshaw, Winthrop Murray Crane, Road Smoot and William Crocker; deliberately insulting progressive leaders in the west, like Hiram Johnson, Miles Poindexter and Robert M. LaFollette; dropping the Roosevelt issues and taking in insignificant non-im-

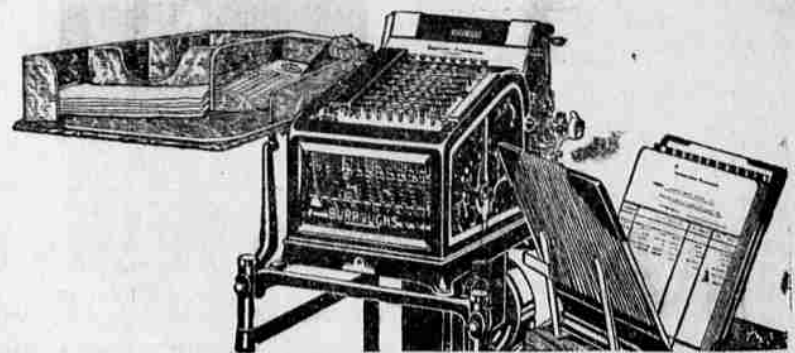
portant matters such as the dismissal of Durrant from the census office; and, finally, the general unprogressive “jumpy-footing” campaign made by Hughes with the evident intention to alienate no hyphenated vote.

Add to these, Hughes' criticism of the eight-hour day, with its further alienation of the labor vote, it would seem as if the Hughes managers had been intent only on mixing their own political poison.
