The political meeting held at the Willow Springs school house on October 26, was to have been a debate between the representatives of the republican and democratic parties. On the democratic side there were to be two speakers: Mr. Neff and Judge Kelly. The republican representatives failed to appear.

Judge Kelly explained the reason for this by saying that the Willow Springs farmers were not interested in the republican platform. We shall not attempt either to justify or deny this charge. The first speaker was

Mr. Neff. He started out by relating the horrors of war. He informed his audience that about a per cent of the male population of British Columbia of military age were under colors. Many of these had already been on the battle field in Europe; some had returned to recover from their wounds; many had returned with a leg or an arm and many came back sightless; and many there are who will never return. He explained the whole European war was due largely to the fact that the nations engaged preferred to resort to bullets rather than diplomacy. He called the attention of his audience to the condition our own country would be in had we resorted to bullets rather than words. "And we declared war on Germany after the sinking of the Lusitania, we would have satisfied the Rooseveltian element of our population, who prefer to show off their physical strength rather than their intellectual. He explained that we received assurances from Germany that it would discontinue the barbarous method of warfare. Had we gone to war we would have got no more than this. In fact, had we gone to war, Germany would have continued her submarine warfare unabated and sunk American ships as well as those of the allies without warning. If 9 per cent of the population of this country had been called to the colors same as in Canada, about 600 young men would have left Medford for the field of battle. Some of these young men would never return, and some would return as wrecks, dependent upon their relatives and charity for the rest of their lives. Instead of a few Americans losing their lives on the Lusitania, we would have lost thousands as many, besides enduring all the horrors of war, and we would have gained nothing. For escaping all of this, we have to thank Wilson." Judge Kelly then took the floor. He enumerated many of the measures enacted by the present administration, explaining that this administration had accomplished more for the benefit of the common people than a generation of republican administrations. He mentioned, among other measures, that of the tariff commission, farmer's loan, child labor, etc. At the close of the meeting, there were few Willow Springs farmers, who did not feel that Wilson is a pretty good president to keep in office for another term.

Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

NONMOUTH, Ore., June 26.—The Oregon Normal school opened this week. Students enrolled 785, largest on record for state Normal in Oregon. . . . how to care for large student body a problem. . . . been crowded into auditorium with seating capacity of 250. Classrooms filled with extra chairs in aisles. More than 150 students seated on platform. New heating system completed, additions to rooming houses built and tents used. One hundred girls sleep on upper part of school.

The official school report gives 150 grade pupils in Nonmouth, for teacher practice.
