

MAIL TRIBUNE STRAW BALLOT TO BE PRINTED MONDAY

The Mail Tribune is taking a straw vote in Medford, Ashland, Talent, Phoenix, Central Point and Gold Hill to ascertain the drift of sentiment in the county.

The vote will not be completed in time to print in this issue, but will be published Monday, with The Mail Tribune prediction as to Jackson counts.

The ballots were left indiscriminately in the residence district and collected the next day. The intention is to make as accurate a forecast as possible.

Voters are asked to ballot upon their choice for president and congressmen and on the brewers amendment and prohibition amendment.

In addition to the straw vote, the poll of the county schools will also be given.

FIVE THOUSAND DEED FOR MILE GAINED

MTHLIN, Nov. 4.—Estimates of the Franco-British losses during the four months offensive on the Somme front, emanating from German general headquarters in the west, give the losses in round numbers as 600,000. The survey places the British losses at 400,000 and those of the French at 150,000. The estimates, the survey says, are regarded as moderate, in view of the fact that the British casualty lists admit losses of 372,000 to the end of September. The writer claims that each square mile of territory recovered cost the allies more than 5,000.

That the original purpose was to get through, the writer says, is shown by the prodigious scale of the preparation and the huge masses of cavalry held in readiness to begin the pursuit through the broken German lines. The writer contends that the claim of the entente allies that the plan of the offensive was not to breach the German lines, but merely to relieve the pressure elsewhere by holding fast a large part of the German forces is only an afterthought invented to cover the evident failure of the offensive to reach its objective.

CROWD BLOCKS STREETS TO WELCOME HUGHES

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Chailes E. Hughes wound up his 26,000 miles presidential campaign tour with sixteen strenuous hours of campaigning last night down the Hudson river valley and in Brooklyn. The nominee delivered nine speeches, starting at 8:45 o'clock this morning and did not reach his hotel until after midnight tonight.

Tomorrow, the last day of his campaign, was to have been a day of rest with a big rally at Madison Square Garden tonight. Instead it will be a whirlwind day of more speaking in New York City. When the nominee arrived here tonight he found that the national committee had speeded up the campaign so that he will spend virtually the entire afternoon touring the city. Five speeches are on his program.

In almost every speech today and tonight the nominee told his audience he was confident of victory next Tuesday. He told them there was little to be said with regard to the issues of the campaign. On his trip down the Hudson river valley he made the tariff one of the chief themes of his speeches here tonight. He spoke chiefly of Americanism.

DEER PELTERS TO BE PROSECUTED BY PORTLANDERS

The act of killing a deer by pelting it with rocks is not approved by the Red Star Animal Relief Society; on the contrary, that organization, composed of persons with humane tendencies, will start a prosecution of two Ashland men, who used this primitive but cruel way of disposing of a big buck in the Applegate River district of Jackson county recently.

At its meeting Tuesday night at the Central Library, the society, which is organized to promote humane treatment of animals, strongly denounced the incident, as recounted in news dispatches from Ashland. It appears that J. B. Coleman, candidate for assessor of Jackson county, and Dr. J. E. Hart, of Talent, were campaigning in the Applegate district and came across a deer swimming across a pool. They pelted it with rocks and after an hour of this treatment, it is said the deer died. The two men are said to have tied the carcass to their automobile and returned to town in triumph.

Members of the society said that if the deer had been shot, as that is recognized as the humane way of killing deer or other wild animals, no objection could be raised. Claude Simpson, a member of the society, was named a committee of one to bring the matter to the attention of the district attorney of Jackson county, and urge prosecution.

EX-PRESIDENT TAFT ASSAILS ADAMSON BILL

RUTLAND, Va., Nov. 4.—Speaking at a political meeting here tonight former President Taft referred to the foreign policies of the administration and said:

"We will stand behind the president when he makes an assertion of our rights, but to refrain from proper criticism of a public official is to subvert public policy."

Taking up the Adamson eight hour bill, Mr. Taft said:

"I don't care what the merits of the case were; I don't care whether the men were or were not entitled to more pay. A bill passed under a threat of force without debate or proper consideration is a humiliating disgrace to the nation."

ROOSEVELT FLAYS WILSON'S ATTITUDE

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt criticized President Wilson in emphatic words tonight in an address at Cooper Union, delivered at the request of a campaign organization of business men, who oppose the re-election of Mr. Wilson.

Taking as his subject "Our Nation's Crisis," Colonel Roosevelt said that a world cataclysm has overwhelmed civilization and that "the times have needed a Washington or a Lincoln, but unfortunately we have
