

WASHINGTON FOR PRESIDENT BY GOOD PLURALITY

BELLINGHAM, Wn., Nov. 8.—Twelve precincts out of 33 in Skagit county give for congress, Hadley 759; Axtell 649.

TACOMA, Wn., Nov. 8.—17 precincts in Pierce county out of 217 give for president, Hughes 13,312; Wilson 14,685.

Returns from 160 precincts for United States senator give Poindexter 14,421, Turner 11,357. Returns from 181 precincts for governor, McBride 11,520, Lister 13,529.

SEATTLE, Wn., Nov. 8.—Returns from 1933 precincts of 2385 in Washington give: Hughes 80,854; Wilson 88,911.

Nine hundred eighty two precincts give for senator, Poindexter, rep., 83,795; Turner, dem., 56,872.

Nine hundred forty precincts give for governor, McBride, rep., 68,939; Lister, dem., 71,847.

SEATTLE, Wn., Nov. 8.—In the first Washington congressional district partial returns, including most of the city of Seattle, indicate the election of Miller, republican, over Cotterill, democrat.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 8.—Returns from 1071 precincts of 2385 in Washington give Hughes 82,684; Wilson 90,665.

Returns from 1010 precincts give for senator: Poindexter, rep., 80,981; Turner, democrat, 58,050.

Cotterill Defeated.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 8.—Partial returns from all counties in the fifth congressional district indicate the re-election of Hill, democrat. Returns give Hill 12,283; Corkery 10,758.

SPOKANE, Wn., Nov. 8.—One hundred two precincts of Spokane, 77 complete and 25 incomplete give Wilson 13,828; Hughes 13,171; Poindexter 11,341; Turner 8,169.

SEATTLE, Wn., Nov. 8.—Returns from 232 precincts in Seattle give Miller, rep., for congress in the first district, 29,524; Cotterill, dem., 24,606. Returns from Kitsap county are lacking, but Miller appears to be sure of election.

WALLA WALLA, Wn., Nov. 8.—Twenty three complete precincts in Walla Walla county out of 45 give Hughes 1697; Wilson 1879; Poindexter 2146; Turner 1404; McBride 1558; Lister 2084.

DEMOCRATS TO CONTROL CONGRESS

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Late returns from Ohio indicating the re-election of Senator Alben Pompeene, democrat, over Myron T. Herrick, republican, virtually ended the possibility of republican ascendancy in the senate. With democratic leaders insisting that Hatchcock in Nebraska and Pittman in Nevada have been re-elected and with Kendrick probably elected in Wyoming, the political status of the new senate would thus be: democrats 52, republicans 42, with the result in Arizona and New Mexico still in doubt. Should the republicans carry both, the democratic majority in the senate would be right.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Nov. 8.—Hadley's lead over Axtell for congress from the second district in 23 out of 160 precincts in Whatcom county was 808.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Nov. 8.—Twenty-one precincts out of 73 in Skagit county give for congress: Hadley, 1,826; Axtell, 2,130.

SEATTLE, Nov. 8.—Returns from 1,218 precincts of 2,385 in Washington gave Hughes, 94,711; Wilson, 103,516. Returns from 1,121 precincts give for senator: Poindexter, republican, 98,452; Turner, democrat, 67,291. Returns from 1,093 precincts give for governor: McBride, republican, 82,461; Lister, democrat, 89,963.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 8.—St. Louis city complete except four precincts give 12,978 for prohibition and 139,271 against.

WILSON WINS ASHLAND BY 39 VOTES IN 1679

ASHLAND, Nov. 8.—This city cast 1800 yesterday. Counting in about its normal vote in general elections the last of nine precincts was completed Wednesday noon. Wilson wins here by a slight plurality. Figures on electors, county ticket and amendments follow, none on state results being given.

ELECTION CAUSES EXCITEMENT ABROAD

LONDON, Nov. 8.—The presidential election in the United States excited intense interest throughout London. The morning newspaper announced that Charles E. Hughes had been elected and this was taken for granted until the tickers and the early evening newspapers showed that the issue was in doubt. From that time forward, excited groups assembled in the clubs and hotels scanning the latest returns. The American embassy was besieged for news, many requests coming from British officials.

DRYS MAKE GAIN OF FOUR STATES

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—Oliver W. Stewart, national prohibition campaign manager, expressed gratification over the result of wet and dry fights in states today. "Returns indicate that the drys have added four states, Michigan, South Dakota, Nebraska and Montana to the dry column," said Mr. Stewart. "We saved Arkansas to the array of nineteen dry states with which we entered the campaign. The election of Hamberger as governor of Utah, a democrat favoring prohibition, I think, means prohibition by statute out there. We are particularly pleased as the victory for woman's suffrage in South Dakota means the election of officials who will make the prohibition law effective."

ALASKA VOTES FOR PROHIBITION

JUNEAU, Alaska, Nov. 8.—Of 5549 votes cast in twenty-five Alaska towns, including Kennebec, Circle, Valdez, Fairbanks, Seward, Anchorage, St. Michael, Wrangell, Ketchikan, Council, Iditarod, Fort Yukon and Seward, 3512 were for prohibition and 2037 against. For delegate to congress the same towns give Sulzer, democrat, for delegate to congress, 3001; Wickersham, republican, 2946.

NORTH DAKOTA IN DOUBTFUL COLUMN

FARGO, N. D., Nov. 8.—North Dakota swung into the doubtful column in the presidential race late today when slowly incoming returns from the outlying districts wiped away President Wilson's lead and with slightly more than half the total precincts reported, gave a plurality of 20 votes to Charles E. Hughes. The vote for 1061 precincts out of 1859 in the state gave Hughes 32,474; Wilson 32,454.
