CATE TO ADDRESS RANCHERS NOVEMBER 11 The Farmers' and Fruitgrowers' league have found in the annual report of County Pathologist C. C. Cate made to the county court and the extension service of the Oregon Agricultural college so much material of interest and value to the community that it has been decided to hold a meeting of the league on Saturday, November 11, at the public library, Medford, to hear the report read. All farmers and fruitgrowers, whether members or not, are invited and urged to attend the meeting. In addition to reading the report, Mr. Cate has consented to give additional facts to those brought out in the report on the subject of the control of crown gall, which has led to a possibly still more valuable discovery of assistance in control of root blight; the growing of vetch, some facts of interest to farmer and fruit grower; the use of miscible oil sprays as affecting blight control. If time permits, some other subjects of the report will be covered and questions answered on any of the features of the report. The subjects treated in the report are: Public Meetings. Frost Fighting, Thermometer Testing. Soil moisture determination, duty of water investigation. Inoculation for leguminous seeds. Plant disease investigations. Spraying for the prevention of scab. Fruit ripening studies. Investigation to determine proper stage of development for picking various varieties of pears and apples. Pear and apple blight investigations. Use of oil sprays as a repellent to insects. Crown gall, control by the application of various materials. Experiment to control powdery mildew on apples. Mushroom root rot. Study of disinfectants. Codlin moth investigations. Blight control vs. insect control. Potato tuber moth, inspection and condemnation. Dust spraying for codlin moth and weab. Collection of insects. Farm and orchard visits. BROWN EASILY DEFEATS YALE BY SCORE OF 21 TO 6 NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 11.—Brown with an unbroken record of victories this season entered the game with Yale here today. The followers of the Blue were not too sanguine of winning. A field goal by Braden of Yale was the only scoring in the first period. Yale kept the visitors on the defensive during the whole period, Yale, 2; Brown, 0. In the second period, Braden made another field goal from the thirty-yard line. NEW KINGDOM OF ARABIA FORMED BY REVOLUTIONISTS WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—Formation of the new kingdom of Arabia with Grand Sherref Hussein Ben Ali as monarch and Mecca as the capital, was reported to the state department today in an undated telegram from Mecca, signed by Sherref Abdullah, minister of foreign affairs. The Arab nation, Abdvallah said, would henceforth be an active member of the society of nations and confidently looked forward to recognition by the United States. The new kingdom resulted, he said, from a meeting of the nobles and citizens of the country, who definitely threw off the yoke of the committee union and progress at Constantinople. The state department knows nothing of the new premier and does not know how to reach the foreign minister, owing to the absence of any consular or diplomatic representative in Arabia. Investigation into the situation, however, may be possible through British or French sources. The request for recognition is expected to be met in much the same way as other governmental changes during the war. In Egypt when the new khedivate was established in December, 1914, consular officers were instructed to recognize the new officials as de facto. With respect to the new government of Poland the United States will postpone action until peace is established.
