BOURKE COCKRAN ATTORNEY FOR BILLINGS TRIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—Bourke Cockran, New York City attorney and former congressman, will defend without charge, the five persons indicted here for the murder of Warren K. Billings, one of the alleged bomb conspirators, who was sentenced to life imprisonment.

Nolan, and probably Billings again, is now set for November 27, but it was believed it would be continued to make way for another murder trial.

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DAVIS CAL., IN GRIP OF FLAMES TOWN IS DOOMED

DAVIS, Cal., Nov. 12.—Nine buildings have been destroyed by fire at 1:30 p. m. today. The Masonic temple was burning and a gale was blowing.

Fire started in the rear of a pool room and spread rapidly. As it progressed, communication with Sacramento, the nearest city, was cut off and the town was isolated. All able-bodied residents joined in fighting the flames, but the howling wind carried them from building to building, and the destruction of the entire town was threatened. Help arrived from Sacramento and through the Southern Pacific's fire train in time to save most of the residences.

At 2 p. m. the Masonic temple seemed doomed. The city of Davis recently appropriated money for a fire department, but the apparatus had not yet been purchased.

SACRAMENTO, Nov. 12.—Fire is sweeping the town of Davis, Yolo county, 14 miles from here. Starting in a pool room, the blaze spread to the adjoining buildings and the main block in the town is now on fire. Fire apparatus from Sacramento and the Southern Pacific has been rushed to the town. The Davis state university farm is not in danger.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 12.—Seven buildings had been destroyed by 12:30 p. m. in a fire at Davis; the bank building was thought to be safe, according to reports reaching the Southern Pacific company here. The company's fire fighting apparatus had arrived and was in service at that hour.

SIXTY YEAR OLD RECORD BROKEN

YAN COUVER, Wash., Nov. 12.—Records for cold in the first half of November for the past 60 years were broken here early today when the thermometer reached 20 degrees above zero, according to government observers. The weather records at the Vancouver army barracks are considered the oldest in the Northwest, having been kept since 1851. The lowest mark set in November until today was 22 above.
