## JOINT COMMISSION UNABLE TO AGREE, OBJECT TO PACT

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 14.—Vigorous opposition today by Luis Cabrera, chairman of the Mexican representatives, prevented a formal agreement by the Mexican-American commission on the primitive and essential points of the plan for the withdrawal of the American troops from Mexico and other questions that have arisen between the two countries.

It became known today that yesterday while Mr. Cabrera, who is Philadelphian, conferring with Rafael Nieto, sub-secretary of the department of finance, Carranza's other representative and the American commissioners entered into an agreement which the Mexicans believed would be ratified by Mr. Cabrera. When Cabrera appeared before the commission today, however, he objected to certain terms in the proposed agreement and for an hour addressed the commissioners, protesting against the plan as agreed to by the other two Mexicans.

This unexpected opposition by Mr. Cabrera is believed to have brought the commissioners once more to a position where a solution of the international problems cannot be reached for several days at least.

## RAILROADS BREAK RELATIONS WITH BROTHERHOODS

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The managers committee of the railroads, following the breaking off yesterday of its conference with the brotherhood heads on the application of the Adamson eight-hour law, continued deliberations alone today in executive session. Nothing was announced as to whether there would be another conference between the managers and the brotherhood representative, but it was reported that they might meet in Washington some time during the week when the congressional hearing on the law begins.

LEWIS, Nov. 14.—The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railroad today filed suit in federal court here to test the Adamson eight-hour law. United States District Attorney Allen and several railroad men are named as defendants. A temporary injunction is asked to restrain Allen and the others from enforcing the law.

Mrs. Flagler, who is reported to be worth between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000, is to be buried tomorrow in Judge Robert Worth Bingham of Louisville, Ky.
